Five Million Pounds Of Butter In Cargo

Record Breaking Cargo of New Zealand Butter Landed at Halifax, Bringing Total Imports to 10,500,000 Pounds.

HALIFAX, Jan. 28.—Smashing all previous records for butter cargoes landed at Halifax and bringing the total of such imports from New Zealand this season to more than 10,500,000 pounds, the big freighter Port Curtis arrived in Halifax Saturday midnight from Auckland, with 110,000 cases of more than 5,000,000 pounds of butter on board.

Ray Treatment Discontinued

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Jan. 28.—Lord Dawson of Penn paid a single visit to Buckingham Palace tonight. He issued no bulletin but it was announced that the King maintained progress in regaining his health. No violet ray treatment has been applied for more than a week. The royal patient at present is requiring good nursing solely. There was a family dinner at the Palace tonight and the Prince of Wales joined the table before starting on his tour of distressed mining districts.

Burned to Death

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Jan. 28.—At Duck Bay, tiny fishing hamlet on the shore of Lake Winnipegosis, a husband and wife were burned to death in their little home according to word received here today. The victims of the double tragedy are M. and Mme. Lamerand, aged 42, and 45, settled settlers who kept a shopping place at the northern settlement. Flamed from the burning building, started Saturday morning roused the startled settlers from their sleep and they rushed to the assistance of the ill-fated couple. Before aid was possible, however, the ravaging flames claimed their victims.

SHIPPING WARNED OF V-4 TRIALS

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Jan. 28.—A general warning has been issued to shipping by the Navy Department that during the next five or six weeks the submarine V-4 will be undergoing trials over the standardization courses off here. The warning was issued as a precaution against a repetition of the S-4 disaster. The latter submarine was lost with all her crew off here when rammed by a Coast Guard Destroyer as the submersible was rising to the surface.

Cured By Faith

(Canadian Press) QUEBEC, Jan. 28.—A case of a faith cure of cancer, final verification of which will be made or denied in March, is reported here by three doctors who desire their names withheld for the present. The case is that of Albert Cloutier of Arago St., Quebec, who says that last September he was taken to hospital where three doctors examined him and said that only an operation could save him from death. He was suffering from cancer in the stomach.

Chamberlain and Kellogg Pact

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Jan. 28.—Sir Austen Chamberlain, British Foreign Secretary, told the House of Commons today that the British Government today intends to deposit its ratification of the Kellogg-Briand peace pact as soon as the Dominion Governments are in a position to do likewise. Sir Austen said specific ratification by parliament was unnecessary since opinion in both houses from the first had been so strongly in favor of the pact.

Full Quota Raised For University

HALIFAX, Jan. 28.—Coinciding with the new building activities of King's University it is announced by the President of that institution that the full quota of \$400,000 required under the terms of the offer of the Carnegie Corporation has been raised. This qualifies the grant which the \$600,000 Carnegie grant which has now been paid over to King's. The total amount pledged during the King's campaign is \$445,509, and of this amount, Dr. Moore reports, \$405,298 already has been paid up.
