Island Horses Take Two Events Of Nine Raced At Inter-Provincial Ice Meet

HALIFAX, Feb. 4.—Horses from Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island competed Saturday and Sunday in a two-day ice-racing program on the Halifax Common and Lake Mic-Mac. About 10,000 persons saw the races.

Of the nine events, Island horses captured two, with a pair of firsts going to Halifax, two to Dartmouth, two to Pughwash, N.S., and one to Oxford, N.S.

The Prince Edward Island entry, Dr. Budlong, won the Class D event on the lake ice today, taking the first heat in straight heats from Bud the Tramp. Willis was driver of the winner.

Margaret Jean, another P. E. I. entry, took the Class C race Saturday after dropping to sixth place in the opening heat. Driven by A. B. Cuthill, Margaret Jean came through with clean-cut victories in the second and third heats. The first heat was won by Lucky Guy, Harold Cudmore, Miss America, from Charlottetown, lost out to Symbol Harry in the Class A event yesterday after taking one heat.

The Island mare lost the first heat to Judd in a close fight to the wire and then took the second by a nose. Symbol Harry won the third heat, and walked away with the race-off between the three heat winners, with Miss America in second.

Byron Nelson Wins New Golf Championship

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., Feb. 4.—(AP)—Byron Nelson celebrated his 33rd birthday by winning the championship of the Corpus Christi open golf tournament today finishing with a 26 that left him four strokes better than Harold (Jug) McSpaden.

Nelson shot a five under par 65 in the morning round and it was well that he did because in the final 18 holes he evened his lead and had McSpaden approach him morning pace of 63 which tied the competition course record. Nelson would have fallen.

As it was the Sanford, Me., professional shot one over par and none of the other leaders had hot rounds in the finals.

Nelson drew down \$10,000 in war bonds for capturing his third tournament of the winter tour that started in Portland in November.

Since the first of the year he has finished no lower than a tie for second in five tournaments.

McSpaden, who finished second place while Ky Lattoum of Chicago and Sam Schneider of Corpus Christi tied for fifth and split \$1,000.

Craig Wood was third with 270 while Jimmy Demaret of Corpus Christi Navy Station and Sam Byrd of Detroit tied for sixth and seventh.

Seek To Clarify Challenge N. H. L. Players Eligible For Play

MONTREAL, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Conny Smythe of Toronto Maple Leafs said Saturday at his suggestion the National Hockey League had decided to appoint a committee to investigate the players' challenge to the league's constitution.

The suggestion was adopted unanimously at a meeting of the league's board of governors here Friday. The meeting, it was decided that the league would suggest that four classes of men should be declared eligible to play in the league without restriction for the duration of the war.

The suggested classes are: 1. Men discharged from the armed forces. 2. Men rejected by the armed forces, employed in essential industry. 3. Bona fide students who have not reached their 20th birthday. 4. Men who are not in a callable military class.
