ACTIVE YEAR FOR I.O.D.E. AT S' SIDE

Encouraging Reports Submitted At Annual Meeting Of Abegweit Chapter I. O. D. E.

The annual meeting of the Abegweit Chapter I. O. D. E. was held on Thursday afternoon in the Summerside rooms. There was a large attendance and many matters of interest discussed. Miss Hunt, the Regent, presided. The following reports were submitted for the year.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Madam Regent and members, I beg to submit the following report of our year's work. We have held ten regular meetings during the year with an average attendance of eleven also two executive meetings to consider different matters. Early in the year our society suffered a severe loss in the death of Mrs. Neil McLeod. She had been our Regent for several years and as Convener of the War Memorial had done splendid work, we miss her wise counsel. She was much interested in the League of Nations and any thing for the promotion of peace and against anything of a war like attitude, and to keep her memory with us have decided to give a prize each year to the High School. This to be called the Ada McLeod prize, the children are writing now on the work of the League of Nations and the prize will be given at the close of the school year. The first part of June we lost another valued member, Mrs. Creelman McArthur. She too had served as Regent and in other ways represented us at the National Convention and always helping in any way she could. About the first part of June we had a very pleasant affair in the home of Miss McKelvie and Mrs. Sonneman Mrs. Harman, late of China, spoke to us of the interesting country, its people and customs. A large number attended and a very pleasant afternoon spent, and a goodly sum realized to add to our funds. In June we helped in the Red Cross drive for funds to carry on their work, we also made plans at our June meeting for the picnic for children who do not enjoy this privilege very often and 140 children were entertained, members taking them to the shore in their cars and serving a lunch while there. We also helped the Boy Scouts by giving \$10.00 to help buy equipment and helped in the arranging and the giving of gifts for the community Christmas Tree that was held to give gifts to the poorer children of the town. We took part in the celebration in the square on Armistice Day. Our Regent placing a wreath at the foot of the monument. Heaps, Labor, Winnipeg North, suggested a 20 percent reduction in interest on Dominion Bonds. This he said, would save the country \$20,000,000 a year and would be more equitable than cutting salaries.

Not for a minute would he admit any lack of good faith on the part of the Prime Minister or himself in continuing the cut for another year, said Finance Minister E. N. Rhodes. "No one would be more delighted than myself if it were unnecessary to continue it, he said. But conditions required it.

Hon. Peter Heenan, (Lib., Kenora-Rainy River) would not agree to any reduction. Lowering the purchasing power of the people only aggravated the economic distress. Furthermore the Government, in initiating the salary cut a year ago, had set an example that had been followed by many private employers.

Humphrey Mitchell, (Lab., Hamilton East), described the proposed salary cut as "psychologically sound but economically unsound." He thought the Government should conform with the finding of its own economists in the Department of Labor who had fixed \$1,600 per year as the minimum upon which a family of five could exist without lowering the standard of living.

The Treasurer's report for the year ending Jan. 31 showed a small balance on the credit side.

SUMMERSIDE PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

The Library year closed again showing an increase in circulation of 567 more books and magazines, over the year ending in January 1932. Last year showed an increase of 1850 over the previous year. Expenses were practically the same for each of these years.

Donations of money amounted to \$22.70. Donations of books amounted to between 90 and 100 in all—35 novels from the McGill Book Club, 35 from the Annual Book Tea and between 25 to 30 at other times during the year.

Thirteen books were bought at a cost of \$14.50. Fines were notably less this year in fact one-half the amount.

The total receipts from the Library were \$83.88 and the total expense to the I. O. D. E. \$300.94.

Readers again had the privilege of having 12 McGill Travelling Libraries of 30 books each 60 to 30 books at a time being on the shelves for a period of 3 months.

The Travelling library however, has recently had its allowance for books, greatly reduced and our library will be materially effected in the future.

This year there are by all accounts better things in store for us if the full program of the Carnegie Foundation materializes. Dr. Lomer of McGill visited this province and our library last autumn and assured us that if we wished we could get 500 books at a time from the 10,000 that will be housed in Prince of Wales College.

It was proposed also that a summer library course be given in Charlottetown conducted by trained librarians and as part of the course our library would be recatalogued according to standardized methods used in all large libraries.

Another suggestion made was for a motor van containing books to go over the Island with a trained librarian to give out books to anyone who wished them.

The Province would be under no expense the Carnegie Foundation carrying the full cost. The Public Library, the activity of the I. O. D. E. in Summerside, is justifying itself but the financing of it is a considerable problem. The committee feels assured, however, that the public will continue to appreciate the benefit of the Library and give the necessary support.
