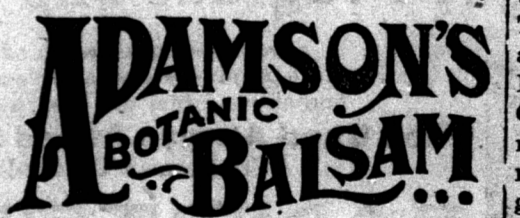

THE Frank C. Batt got clear of her winter quarters yesterday and her familiar whistle again mingles with the singing of the birds, giving the harbor quite a summer like appearance. There is still some floating ice in the harbor that prevents her going on her Bedeque route but it will probably be out of the way in the course of the next few days.

The resolution passed by the Citizens League at its meeting on Monday evening and reported in the GUARDIAN yesterday morning was in many respects a most important one and while under discussion called forth some excellent remarks and threw much valuable light on the course pursued by the Town Council in the dismissal of Policeman Peters and the appointment of his successor Mr. D. W. Henderson. While several of the speakers admitted that the method of the dismissal and appointment had been somewhat severely criticized, the temperance sentiment of the town was unanimous in crediting the Council with the best motives and with having acted in the best interests of the temperance cause, and even justly entitled to the hearty support of all temperance workers. In their efforts to enforce the Canada Temperance Act, and further the general moral interests of the town THE GUARDIAN is—as it always has been—heard in cord with them, and will always be ready to lend them its pages and its influence to that end.

By a fugitive copy of the St. John Telegraph dated May 17th, 1896, I learn that the opening of navigation between P. E. I. and the mainland was unusually late that season. A correspondent at Charlottetown dating his letter on May 9th, said that the S. N. C. boats were then making irregular trips between Charlottetown and Pietou and the noted Albert between the latter place and Georgetown. On May 6th the Princess of Wales entered Summerside and on the 8th she tried to reach Point du Chene but was compelled to put back owing to ice; on the following day she succeeded. On the same day the St. Lawrence tried to reach Pietou but was prevented by ice which met her in mid-passage. Quite a fleet of vessels were at that time imprisoned at Summerside, among them the John F. Robertson, Agnes Wilson, Carmanta and Pinta, all owned by Angus McMillan and laden with oats for the British market; the Katie Stewart and Lizzie Evans owned by John Lefurgey, the Jabel, belonging to Welsh & Owen, Charlottetown. Besides the above there were sixteen schooners, all loaded and waiting for a move in the ice. A despatch from Point du Chene dated May 15th, stated that the Island side of the strait was still barricaded with ice; a steamer lay opposite the Point and another steamer reported off Cape Casey light, also two sailing vessels, all locked in the ice. That was probably the same season when teams crossed the ice a mile or two east of Summerside to Lower Bedeque on the 6th of May.

The first quarterly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held in their room in Market Building yesterday evening, nearly all the members being present. After reading of minutes and routine work a number of letters and telegrams were read relative to harbor improvement, steamship communication, etc. An important communication from the Charlottetown Board of Trade was read in reference to improved telegraph service. The communication was accompanied by a draft letter to Sir L. H. Davies for joint signature by the Summerside Board drawing attention to the "great wants of an improved telegraph service and while recognizing the able and earnest efforts already made by him to secure for the people of P. E. Island equal telegraph facilities with those enjoyed in other sections of Canada the Board express their desire to strengthen his hands in any way that might assist in hastening that most desirable confirmation." This letter was accompanied by a letter also for joint signature to each of the Island representatives and Senators at Ottawa, urging it as an effort is being made to secure such action by the government of Canada, as may remedy the grievances and disability complained of by them their best effort to bring about the required changes and improvements and urge upon the government the importance of effecting the same with the least possible delay. These letters were unanimously approved of by the Board and the secretary instructed to have them signed and returned at once to the Charlottetown Board of Trade. The Secretary reported that the membership of the Board is now 55. Eleven propositions for membership were received and accepted. Mr. J. H. Bell, M. P. was present at the meeting.

## A Coal Strike Responsible.

Late despatches have been telling of the serious condition of affairs in England over the scarcity of coal, in consequence of strikes in some coal districts, and the number of miners who have left Wales to engage in the South Africa war. Then the greatly increased demand for coal on account of improvement of business has

also helped to increase a coal famine. Germany for first time in history, is unable to employ about a million toilers, not because of lack of work, but because of lack of fuel and raw stuffs. The Australian coal strike is partly responsible for this, and all the industries there are overworked with orders, the iron industry being the most affected, the Prussian government, alone, having recently placed orders for 600 loco-

motives and 9,000 cars. The whole manufacturing industry is in a similar condition. The bicycle works have closed to make the German shipyards are overworked. The vessels in course of construction in the yards there are now in progress of completion. 523 vessels of every kind. The situation shows how dependent are the industries on coal.

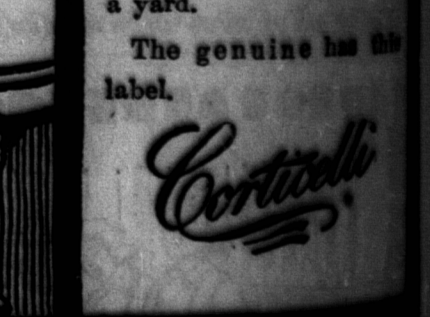
