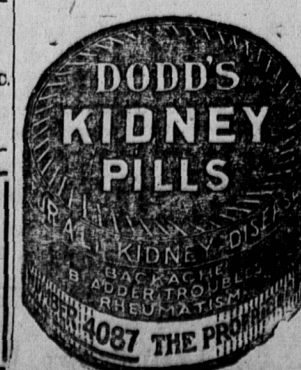
Now since the ice is here horsemen are seen exercising their horses for speed. The fastest so far is a 3 year old owned by Mr. Gus Laverty.

CIVIC NOMINATION DAY AT SUMMERSIDE—Tuesday was Nomination Day at Summerside for the civic election which takes place on Tuesday next for a Mayor, three Councillors and one Water and Sewerage Commissioner. Although the proceedings were quick and there does not appear to be much stir on the surface as yet, there is more interest shown than for several years past and all the seats will be contested but one. The chief fight will naturally be for the Mayorship, and Mr. B. W. Robinson, although running for the premier honors for the first time, is expected to give his veteran opponent no walk over. The nominations were as follows:—For Mayor, Messrs. Winstoe J. Lidstone and Brewer W. Robinson. For Councillors—West Ward, Mr. Leonard M. MacNeill, elected by acclamation; Centre Ward, Messrs. Louis A. Moore and Morley M. Bell; East Ward, Messrs. Wilfred Kelly and Archibald Sharp; For Water and Sewerage Commissioner, Messrs. Hugh M. Sudbury, Joseph Richard and James A. Prichard. S

CONVICTED OF ASSAULT—A serious assault case came up before Chief Magistrate Ernest H. Strong at Summerside on Tuesday morning. The complainant and accused were both residents of O'Leary, and apparently operated rival taxi business in that vicinity. The accused alleged that the complainant had interfered with his trade by taking away a fare whom he had contracted to drive to West Devon. Thereupon the accused went to the stable of the complainant, and administered to him a severe beating with his fists. Evidence was given on the part of the prosecution by the complainant, Mr. George Palmer, by his hired man, George MacDonald, and by Doctor MacPhee of Summerside, who attended to his wounds. The accused, Mr. George Ellis, then gave evidence, admitting the assault, but alleged that he had lost his temper on account of the way in which Palmer kept interfering with his business. After hearing the argument of Counsel, Mr. Heath Strong K. C., for the accused, and Mr. Thane A. Campbell for the complainant, His Honor gave judgment convicting the prisoner, and sentencing him to a fine of \$100.00 and costs or two months in goal, with an additional provision that he should be bound over to keep the peace for a period of one year. S

LATE MR. NEIL R. MATTHEWS—The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon at his late residence at Baltic to Malpeque Cemetery of Mr. Neil R. Matthews, Rev. 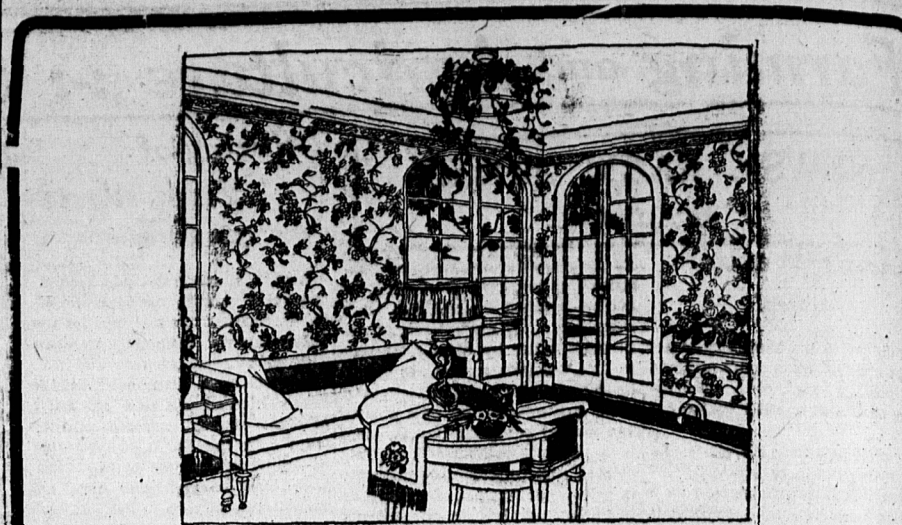
