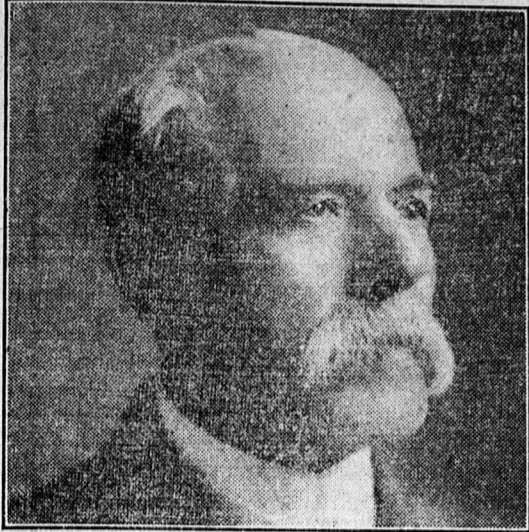

The sale prices of neither horse were mentioned, says the Amherst News.

The late Mr. Duchemin was well known in Charlottetown, having carried on a block making and ship supply business in conjunction with his brother, Mr. Albert Duchemin. This business was situated on the corner of King and King Streets, and afterwards was removed to what is now known as Hogan's Wharf, and subsequently to the head of the Stream Navigation Wharf. Before the latter move, however, the late Mr. Duchemin had severed his connection with the firm and had removed, with his wife and family, to the United States, where he had since resided. During his residence there, he had succeeded, one cause for this being an invention which is now used in railway cars through the United States and Canada. Only the older people in Charlottetown will remember him. He was much respected, and those who knew him in the past will regret to learn of his death.

Mrs. Michael Cahill died suddenly heart failure at Farmington Kings on, on September 20th aged 71 years and her maiden name was Catherine Haffey was the daughter of the late Captain John Haffey one of the pioneers of Farmington.
