Hearing Is Postponed

AMHERST, N. S., Aug. 23—A preliminary hearing into the charge of murder against nurse Margaret Jackson was adjourned for three days today when defence counsel J. A. Hanway, K. C., asked that the charge be reduced. Miss Jackson was arrested Friday following an investigation into circumstances surrounding the death on May 10 of the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. James Corbett, Maccan. The child died of catarrhal nephritis and the investigation disclosed the fact that milk with which it had been fed showed traces of a poisonous disinfectant.

No Comment

(Canadian Press) SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Aug. 22—"I have no comment to make at the present time," said Mr. W. C. Franz, receiver of the Algoma Steel Corporation, when interviewed in regard to the effect of the Imperial Conference treaties on the steel industries.

Chinese Losses Reported Heavy

(Canadian Press) TOKYO, Aug. 22—Government officials today described as a minor local affair a clash between a Japanese military detachment and several hundred Chinese regulars near Peipiao inside the border of the province of Jehol, which lies between China proper and the new State of Manchukuo.

At the same time officials intimated that with favorable autumn weather the Japanese forces would launch action in Jehol to end what Japan considers an unsatisfactory state of affairs in the border of the new Manchukuo administration. While Chinese reports called the clash a determined invasion by Japanese of China proper, the Japanese War Office declared that a Japanese detachment had pursued a force of Chinese to Nanling, in eastern Jehol, subsequently returning to Chaoling. The War Office said this body constituted the only Japanese troops in Jehol. Japanese correspondents at Chinchow declared two Japanese casualties and heavy Chinese losses occurred. Japanese troops in the district have been seeking to effect the return of Gonshiro Ishimoto, former Japanese army officer who was kidnapped, allegedly by Jehol bandits. They entered Jehol a month ago for this purpose.
