The death of Alexander J. O'Toole of Providence R. I., father of Mrs. Thomas R. Riley, took place yesterday. Mrs. Riley received word Tuesday that her father was very low and yesterday another telegram was received announcing his death. He was a most genial man and the news of his death will be heard with a keen regret by his many acquaintances here. He leaves to mourn, besides Mrs. Riley, his daughter, two sons, one of whom is Eddie O'Toole a student of St. Dunstan's College. Mrs. Riley left last night for Providence.  
The sudden death on March 2, 1907, of the late John McLean, Colville, at the age of 82 years, is deserving of more than a passing notice. The deceased was born in the Isle of Skye, Scotland, in the year eighteen hundred and twenty-five. At the age of 12 years he with his parents came to the Island. He received his education in the Charlottetown Academy and taught school for a number of years. He was a consistent member of Brookfield Presbyterian Church, for over twenty-five years. The deceased was a most upright, honest, and well-to-do man, who was well known to all who knew him. He was a most devoted family worshiper and was on about as usual. About a fortnight ago he took his last illness and died at his home in Colville, at the age of 82 years, and had himself buried on the 11th inst. and thus passed away without warning to anyone. The deceased was a man of noble character, upright and honest in his dealing with his fellow-men, kind and friendly to every one, and respected by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.
