CHARLOTTETOWN WILL WELCOME CANADA'S NAVAL SQUADRON

Preparations are Under Way to Give Officers and Men of the Visiting Warships a Warm Reception.

The arrival in Charlottetown next week of the Canadian Naval Squadron, consisting of the cruiser Aurora and the two destroyers Patriot and Patricia, under the command of Capt. Henry G. H. Adams, C. B. E., will be a memorable event for the city. Preparations are being made by the Navy League for their reception and a strong committee, composed of Messrs. Frank Heartz, J. O. Hyndman, A. A. Pomeroy, J. E. Bell, B. W. LePage, M. L. A., George Inman, J. A. McMillan, L. B. McMillan and C. L. Miles has been appointed. Delegates from the committee will wait upon the local government, city council and will get in touch with prominent merchants regarding the decorations of public buildings. The Abegweit is planning putting on an athletic meet at the C. A. A. grounds on Thursday, and a good day's sport will be assured. At the Navy League rooms everything will be provided for the comfort and entertainment of the men.

A concert party of the crew of the visiting squadron will put on an entertainment at one of the local theatres, a programme of which will be submitted upon the arrival of the ships. This concert party have received appreciative comments from the Halifax press.

The Aurora was launched in 1914. Her dimensions are: length, 436 feet, beam 39 feet, tonnage 3,500. She has a horse power of forty thousand, on which she is able to make twenty-nine knots. Her armament consists of two six-inch guns and six four-inch guns. The two destroyers, launched in 1916, have similar dimensions: length 271 feet, beam 27 1/2 feet. They develop twenty-seven thousand horsepower, and are able to make thirty knots. They are armed with three four-inch guns.

The Aurora's complement is 318, and the destroyers carry 80 officers and men each.

The squadron, which left Halifax last night, will call at Sydney before arriving here. After stopping three days at Charlottetown the ships will proceed to Quebec.
