

WIRELESS SYSTEM DOESN'T CHANGE CAPTAIN'S STATUS

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—The "unwritten" law in the marine world that the captain of a ship is supreme commander of his vessel when he leaves port will not be modified by the fact that the wireless system keeps him in constant communication with officials of the company. This question has been raised since the loss of the Republic because practically all action taken by the several ships engaged in the accident followed wireless communications to their company's officer.
