### INQUIRY INTO WAR PURCHASES

(From our own Correspondent.)  
OTTAWA, July 13.—The Commission of inquiry into war contracts at to-day's session heard evidence in regard to three different matters, the purchase of mechanical transport for the first and second contingents, the purchasing of hay and oats from a firm in Vars, Ont., and a complaint by a Montreal firm of druggists that it had not been able to do business with the Militia Department though putting in very low tenders.

This morning's evidence in regard to the purchase of mechanical transport brought the statement from Sir Charles Davidson, that the big saving which Major Thomas, the motor truck expert for the second contingent, claimed to have made, reflected seriously, if correct, on the integrity of those who had bought trucks for the first contingent. Major Thomas maintained in this connection that the transport for the first contingent had been bought at retail prices and for the second contingent at wholesale prices. As regards the non-delivery of the mechanical transport for the second contingent, Major Thomas explained that it was not intended to send it to England, but that it would be shipped direct to France as reinforcements for the first contingent trucks, just as the men of the second contingent were going as reinforcements for the first division.

Evidence in regard to the motor trucks was concluded at the morning session, and the testimony in regard to the supply of oats to the Militia Department was taken up and continued at the afternoon session.

Albert Sparks of Vars, Ont., had obtained a contract to supply 6,000 bushels of No. 2 Western oats to the Government. He had obtained a price of 65 cents, he stated, from Mr. W. H. Dwyer, grain merchant, of Ottawa and Montreal, on this quantity of oats and had sold them at 67 cents per bushel to the Department. Afterward, however, Mr. Dwyer had claimed that the price of the oats he had quoted had been 67 cents and this matter is now in dispute between the parties. On further testimony being taken this afternoon it appeared that whatever the merits of Mr. Sparks or Mr. Dwyer's contention, the Government had not been mulcted, as the price at which the oats were sold, 67 cents, was quite reasonable at the time.

The third matter considered by the Commission was the complaint of C. E. Frost, druggist, of Montreal, that he had been unable, in spite of every effort, to do business in the supply of drugs to the Militia Department. It was shown, however, that Mr. Frost's tenders had been too high, and he expressed his satisfaction with this statement.

### GENERAL HUGHES THANKS A FORMER ENEMY

LONDON, July 12.—"I send you my congratulations and the admiration of my soldiers, who have carried the badge of Canada into the battlefields of Flanders for liberty." This striking message was cabled to Hon. Louis Botha to-day by Major General Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, who fifteen years ago met the South African premier as a foe. Major General Hughes told your correspondent that he had always admired Botha, even when fighting him.

The Minister of Militia received many callers to-day, including Colonial Secretary Law, and himself paid several visits to Whitehall. He was accompanied by Sir Max Aitken, General Carson and Colonel McBain.

Sir Robert Borden spent the weekend quietly in the country with Sir George Perley. He returned to town to-day and paid several visits to members of the Government. To-morrow he will be the guest of honor at a luncheon to be given by the Empire Parliamentary association at the House of Commons, and previous to this he will enjoy a yet greater honor. Sir Robert has also sent a cable of congratulation to Hon. Louis Botha.

### OPERATIONS IN EAST ENTER NEW PHASE

(Special to The Guardian)  
LONDON, July 13.—In the East operations are entering a new phase, the Russians having been successful in their counter offensive against the Austrians in the region of Frasnik. They have taken up positions in the hill north of that town and are apparently waiting for the Austro-Germans to make a move. It is not expected this will be long delayed for General Von Mackenzen has had time to procure reinforcements and supplies of guns and ammunition for the next great effort to secure control of the Lublin, Chelm, railway. The Balkan situation is again in the limelight as a result of disclosures that the Austro-Germans have offered Rumania alternative concessions either to continue neutral or join with them. It is believed in military circles that the Balkan states will not join the Germans but it is considered likely that owing to failure of Russia to hold Galicia and Bukovina they might decide to remain neutral. Of course success by the Allies in the Dardanelles, where they are unofficially reported to have gained further Balkan territory, will change the situation. It is also said that former Greek Premier Venizelos in anticipation of his return to power has arranged to reorganize the Balkan Alliance of which he was initiator.

Venizelos has been a supporter of the entente allies and in the event of such reorganization it is suggested the Balkan States might possibly join this combination.

### ARMENIAN SURVIVORS ARRIVE IN U. S.

NEWPORT NEWS, July 13.—A British steamer arrived here to-day with four survivors of the British mule ship, Armenian, sunk by a German submarine on June 28, with the loss of more than a score of lives. The men who landed here to-day were negro muleteers. They asserted that when they attempted to scramble aboard the submarine they were knocked off by the German sailors, who laughed at them.

### BRYAN OFFERS AN EXPLANATION

HEIMOSA BEACH, Calif., July 13.—Wm. J. Bryan, former Secretary of State, who is spending a brief vacation here, with his son, issued a statement to-day in explanation of what he meant by "unnecessary risk" contained in his comment in connection with the last German note. He said: "Any traveller takes an unnecessary risk when he goes into the war zone on a belligerent ship knowing that the ship is liable to be attacked by submarines. A traveller takes unnecessary risk when he rides on a neutral ship carrying ammunition. "I believe that our Government would be justified in separating passengers from ammunition, but until this is done American travellers will be justified in refusing to take passage on belligerent ships, or a neutral ship carrying ammunition. "If patriotism requires a man to risk his life for his country, when his country is engaged in war, it would seem to be patriotic for a citizen to avoid risks that might involve his lives."

### LIVES OF 100 FISHERMEN IN PERIL

ST. JOHN, N. B., July 10.—The worst storm, for the time of year, that has visited this part of the country in forty years, and as a result William O'Neill, a young fisherman is known to have lost his life, while Samuel Ferguson and Howard Galbraith are still missing.

Besides the men drowned, the storm has caused serious damage along the coast. More than one hundred fishermen were caught out in the gale and the majority of them lost all their gear and were fortunate to escape with their lives. The wind attained a velocity of forty-two miles an hour and continued to blow a gale during the greater part of the day.
