The Provincial Exhibition races this year which will be held August 23rd, 24th and 25th on the Charlottetown Driving Park grounds, are sure to attract attention from owners of race horses throughout the Maritime Provinces, because of the fact that it is the only Exhibition so far advertising a three day program of horse races and it is the only Exhibition which is complete in all departments and will be the biggest in the Maritimes beyond any question. Horse racing has always been a strong factor in connection with our local Fair and this year it is hoped to keep the quality fully up to the standard and provide as good contests as have been given in the past.

In mixed classes, trotters allowed three seconds.

The order of the program will be made so that if possible each horse can start in two races.

SPECIAL PRIZES FOR DRIVERS AND OWNERS

A special ribbon will be given to the owner of the driver winning the most points during the meeting. \$10.00 in Gold to the driver winning second most points during the meet. First place counts five points, second place three points, third place two points and fourth place one point. \$10.00 in Gold will be given to the winning driver in each race. A \$10.00 Gold piece will be given to the driver driving the fastest heat trotted during the meet and a \$10.00 Gold Piece to the driver driving the fastest heat paced during the meet. Ten Dollars in Gold will be given to the owner of the horse trotting the fastest heat and Ten Dollars in Gold to the caretaker of the fastest heat. Five Dollars in Gold will be given to the caretaker of each horse winning a race in the trotting and pacing classes during the meet. Fifty Dollars in Gold will be given to the owner of the horse that beats track record of 2.08 in a race except as provided for below. Fifty Dollars in Gold to the owner of the horse that beats the track trotting record of 2.10 in a race, except as provided for below. In case two horses beat the above records then the awards go to the fastest horse. If two horses tie for the awards the money will be divided equally. Entries close August 6th with J. W. GENERAL CONDITIONS

The Charlottetown Race Track was entirely re-surfaced the fall of 1929. It is now one of the fastest, best laid out and best cared for tracks, and surely the most beautifully situated of any in the Maritime Provinces. A great deal of effort will be made to keep it in apple pie order all through the period before the races and during the races so that no horse will become unsound or suffer injury and to enable them to make fast time. Horsemen by wiring at our expense notifying us of their arrival will be met at train and their baggage transferred to the grounds without cost to them, also taken away without cost to them. Every effort will be made to make the Horsemen's stay pleasant and send them away feeling that they have been well treated. All races to be raced on the three heat plan; 10% of each purse will be awarded to the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat winners they shall race a fourth heat to determine the winner of the event. All purses divided 50, 25, 15 and 10. Entry fee 5%. Five per cent of the money raced for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses. 4% will be deducted from the third horse and 3% from the fourth horse. Six horses to enter, four to start. Right reserved to change program, reject any entry, bar any driver, and to declare race off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain a satisfactory number of entries or starters to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible.

reopen or substitute another class without readvertising, and alter or extend racing dates. Additional entries of an individual ownership may be made in any class by the payment of 1% on closing date, but entries of separate ownership, although in the same stable must pay installments in full. Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 5% is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the Judges. All horses with names of drivers must be declared in by 11 o'clock a. m. the day prior to the race. Eligibility based on N. T. A. money winning Classification and time allowance. The Exhibition Commission assumes no responsibility for any accident or damage to any person or property, during this meeting and this understanding is part of this contract. Hay, Straw, Stabling, free. N. T. A. rules to govern, except where they conflict with these conditions.

THE OFFICIALS

The officials will be selected for their experience and reliability and will be instructed to carry out the rules fairly and to all. All purse money will be paid immediately after the races and horsemen are asked to get same from the Secretary before leaving.

PRESENTATION OF PRIZES

Immediately after the conclusion of the races on Thursday the President will award special ribbons, prizes in Gold, etc., to the winning owners, drivers, caretakers and groomers.

Miss England III Smashes Record

United States Speed Boat Mark Bettered By Kaye Don Yesterday. Attained Speed Of More Than Two Miles A Minute.

LUSS, Loch Lomond, Scotland, July 18—(A.P.)—Kaye Don today drove his new Miss England III over the silvery waters of storied Loch Lomond at the record speed of 119.81 miles an hour to return again to Great Britain the world speed standard on sea.

Twice he drove his powerful boat over the measured mile course, breaking the world mark on both occasions. On the first try, made just at dawn, he averaged 117.43 m. p. h. Not satisfied with that he made another run in mid morning to hang up his new average and for the first time in the history of man traveled at faster than two miles a minute over water. On his second trial he attained a speed of 120.5 m.p.h. on the run with the wind.

"I just kept her full out and she responded like the glorious lady she is," Don told enthusiastic admirers as he came ashore after his record run.

The boat was altered on Don's orders after her poor trials at Lake Gardone, Italy, to make her faster and her performance pleased him immensely.

He had complained that the designers of the hull had been thinking too much of his safety and too little of speed when they first built the boat.

"I'm not worrying about myself," he said then, "what I want is the world record back."

Don's mark broke the old record of Gar Wood, 111.726 by more than eight miles an hour and, experts said, put it beyond reach for some time although Wood is now experimenting with a new Miss America in the hope of defeating Don in the Harmsworth trophy race at Detroit this fall.

Don took his Miss England out with different propellers in the afternoon and made a one way run over the course of 119.1, his third fastest heat of the day, but shut off his engines coming back and did not try to surpass his own record.

The boat was taken out of the water after the tests to be dismantled, overhauled and prepared for shipment to Detroit three weeks hence.

LOOKING 'EM OVER

Percy Williams has found a flashy running mate in young Pearson of Hamilton, who astonished the track world by whirling home in record time. He cracked a world record for the 100 metres which is so extraordinary, that it will act as an invigorating tonic on the whole team and send the team away with a spirit of confidence that augurs well for future success. Wilson and Edwards' victories will have a heartening effect. The Canadian team is a small one but it is select, taken on the basis of their recent performance.

Hi-Y Camp

The annual Hi-Y camp will be held at Margate this year, from July 25th to August 6th.

The tour of New Brunswick which had been planned has been cancelled on account of the high cost and the permanent camp at Margate, which is near the river of the same name, three miles from Kensington, will make a most satisfactory substitute.

About 15 boys under the direction of Glen Partridge as senior leader, and Pat Adair, with Harry Craswell as cook will make up the happy throng. Camp craft, woodlore, first aid, life saving and religious instruction will be a few of the interesting subjects taught by the efficient leaders.

The athletic program will consist mainly of baseball, volleyball, basketball, quiet pitching, track and field events, hiking, diving and swimming. Checkers will also be provided for those who wish it.

A field day will be held on Wednesday afternoon, Aug. 4th, in which all campers will participate. A cordial welcome is extended to any who wish to attend and have an enjoyable afternoon.

Preparations are now under way and an advance guard will leave on Saturday to make ready for the "gang" on Monday.

All those expecting to attend are urged to be on hand at 7 o'clock to make final arrangements.

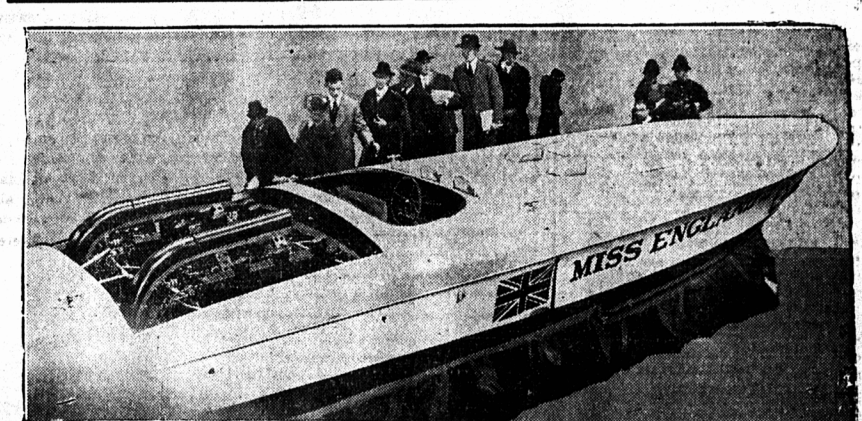
