THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, April 17.—The demand from foreign buyers for oats and barley in the Montreal market today was good, but the volume of business was not large owing to the fact that exporters stated that most of the orders received were at prices that could not be accepted and in consequence only sales of odd loads were made. On the other hand there was a good demand for ocean grain from this port for May loading and especially so from United States exporters which resulted in engagements being made of 80 to 100 loads principally to the continent at firm rates. The May rate to Liverpool, London and Manchester was reduced per quarter to 2 shilling 3 pence for heavy grain, and 2s for oats, while some business was done to Avonmouth at 2s 10d per quarter for heavy grain.

The trade in cash grain on the domestic market showed no improvement the demand from local buyers and exporters being still somewhat limited, but the tone of the market was stronger and prices were advanced an 1 1/2 cents per bushel. A stronger feeling developed in the local market for spring wheat grades of flour and prices were marked up 15 cents per barrel, which was attributed to the renewed strength in the Canadian cash wheat situation. A fair amount of business was transacted in this direction for the local and export count. The market for winter wheat flour was without any new feature to note prices being steady with little business passing. Prices for all lines of millfeed were fully maintained under a good demand from local and outside sources. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats was a little better and prices were unchanged. A steady feeling continued to prevail in the egg market and active business was transacted in the wholesale jobbing way. The undertone to the butter market was firm owing to the continued small supplies of fresh made goods coming forward. Extreme dullness marked the trade in cheese and prices were again easier with western dotted. No. 1 white and colored noted at 18 1/2 cents per pound and No. 2 grades at 17 1/2 cents per pound, while sales of small lots of Quebec 20 pound cheese were made at 18 to 18 1/2 cents per pound. Beans were steady at \$270 per bushel.

(Experimental Farms Note)
Conditions are not entirely uniform over the Maritime Provinces, and hence no set rule can be laid down to cover the whole of the Maritime region that will have equal application to the three provinces. It is rather a case of suggesting a diversity of crops, leaving the choice to the farmer, as he should best know his own local conditions.

The ideal source of summer feed to meet a pasture shortage is the silo. This naturally means a considerable outlay of money in the initial stage, but this handicap can be partly overcome by several farmers co-operating in the purchase of the necessary machinery and later co-operating in the construction of silos and in silo filling. Sunflowers, corn, and the O. P. V. mixture are favourite silage crops. In favored districts corn will give good yields. Sunflowers can be grown successfully in any part of the Maritime Provinces, and are one of the safest crops to grow. The oats, peas, vetch mixture has also a wide range of adaptability. It is a popular practice to grow two of the above crops and sometimes three, thus insuring a crop of one kind or another.

Failing a silo, the next solution will be to grow an annual pasture crop, but unfortunately very few crops are suitable for this purpose. In the case of sheep and hogs, of course, rape offers a ready solution of the problem either for the midsummer or the late fall pasture shortage. A reasonable acreage of rape, say one to two acres, will provide amply for the average farm flock. The safest way is to plant it in drills in a manner similar to turnips, but perhaps to have the drills closer together.

For dairy cattle many farmers depend on soiling crops to meet a short pasture season, and of the different crops perhaps the O. P. V. mixture is the most useful. An acreage of this can be sown, depending on the size of the herd, at regular intervals so that a supply will be available throughout the
