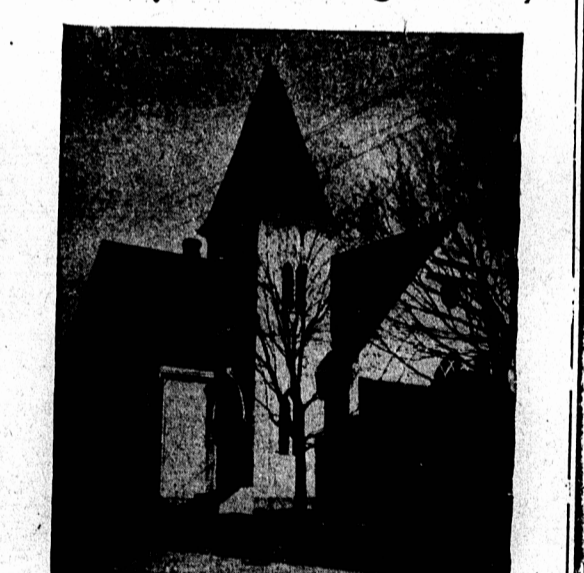

S'ide Church of Christ Has Interesting History

The pretty church of Gothic design on Central Street, Summerside, is known as the Church of Christ and has an interesting origin. On September 13, 1858 the following fifteen people met in the home of Mr. Benjamin Schurman, North St. Eleanor, and under the leadership of Elder Donald Crawford, instituted their first church: Rev. and Mrs. Donald Crawford; Mrs. Crawford, widow of Rev. Alex Crawford of Oxford University; John Crawford; Mrs. Patrick Brown, formerly Mary Crawford; Benjamin Schurman; Miss Ada Jane Schurman (Mrs. Thomas Beattie); Mr. and Mrs. John P. Baker; Mr. and Mrs. Richard Murray; Mrs. George MacKay; Samuel Rodd; Donald MacKay and Montague Baker. Worship was carried on in Brown's Hall, whose owner had married the sister of Elder Crawford and this building, now the Rexall Drug store, still stands on Central Street. Rev. Donald Crawford was on a circuit of three churches and in his absence the elders had charge of the services. Assisting at intervals was Rev. John Knox, D.D., M.D., LL.D., who had his own congregation in Lot 46. About 1862 a church of box-like structure with three long windows on either side was erected on Central Street and the Sunday School was organized shortly after. The building was later remodelled—a vestibule, steeple and another window being added and the steeple replaced by pews. The large pulpit was modernized and a communion table built, these being supplied by Mr. Thomas Beattie. As there was no organ in pioneer days, tuning forks were used and Mr. and Mrs. Beattie led the singing. Much enthusiasm was shown in 1865 when the first annual convention of the island churches was held in Summerside with Dr. John Knox presiding. The first settled pastor was Rev. T. C. Capp who arrived in 1871, remaining for three years. He was a native of Melbourne, Australia. During his ministry a baptistry was built, as previously the baptisms were conducted on the western shore of Bedeque Bay and later on the Linkletter shore. During the disastrous fire of 1908 this church was levelled to the ground, the only furniture saved being the pulpit and pulpit set. A building committee comprising Messrs. Beattie, Riley, Tanlon, Cannon and George A. Jeffrey, who later entered the ministry, erected the present edifice on the same lot in 1907. The new pulpit and communion table were built and

donated by Mr. Beattie. The Woman's Missionary Society was organized in July, 1909 with the following charter members: Mrs. M. P. Schurman, Mrs. Creelman MacArthur, Mrs. John S. Ramsey, Deborah Linkletter (Mrs. Leonard Caseley), Claire Linkletter, Hester Linkletter (Mrs. E. Hansen), Pauline Schurman (Mrs. Stewart Linkletter), Ada Steverson, Jennie Riley, Emily Murray and Mrs. C. MacGregor. Under Rev. A. E. Smith's ministry 1910-1911, many changes were made in the church—a new pulpit, new seats, choir space, pastor's room and baptistry being added. The pulpit Bible was presented by Mrs. James Dunn during Rev. C. Waterworth's pastorate. The Young People's Society, inaugurated during Rev. William Benson's charge in 1943-44, is steadily flourishing. While Rev. R. M. Johnston was pastor, a new Minchall organ was installed and dedicated in 1946, also a kitchen was added. The building was painted and the interior decorated, giving an entirely up-to-date appearance which was much appreciated by the visitors who attended the Maritime Convention of the Churches of Christ in August of the same year. In 1947 at the Easter service a new pulpit light and scarf, which has been presented by Mr. and

Mrs. M. L. Bradshaw, were dedicated. The present elders are Rev. G. A. Jeffrey, Messrs. A. P. Wells, A. Enman, J. Calbeck, H. Linkletter, and I. Crozier; the deacons, Messrs. A. R. MacLure, E. Linkletter, L. Linkletter, C. Murray, L. Wyand, F. Linkletter, E. Calbeck, R. Thompson and M. Murray. Mrs. Winslow Morrison is the church organist and is assisted by Miss Evelyn MacLure. Succeeding in order the first resident pastor, Rev. T. C. Capp were: Reverends, Mr. G. Gunn, W. H. Harding, H. E. Cooke, F. W. Harlow, A. N. Simpson, T. H. Bates, H. R. Bell, E. E. Davidson, C. A. Hatfield, W. H. Harding, C. E. Armstrong, H. R. Bell, G. F. Astler, W. H. Harding, R. E. Stevens, J. W. Hayter, R. L. Morton, W. H. Harding, A. E. Smith, Barry MacLean, C. Waterworth, G. A. Jeffrey, A. B. MacDiarmid, F. J. Williams, G. A. Jeffrey, W. Bilson, R. M. Johnston and W. Bilson, now in charge. All interim work has been graciously taken by Rev. G. A. Jeffrey, who is now in his eighty-eighth year. An influential evangelical spirit must have prevailed in this congregation for twenty-two went out to study for the ministry. Among them the late Rev.
