

Six-Team Basketball League Organized; First Games Scheduled Nov. 30

The Island Physical Fitness Basketball League will get underway here at the Prince of Wales College Auditorium next Wednesday night, November 30th, it was decided last night during the annual meeting of the League held at the Travel Bureau. The opening of the schedule will be a double-header event with Saint Dunstan's University meeting Ray's Millionaires in the first game while Summerside Schurman's meet Army (Rece) in the second encounter.

Lt.-Col. W. J. MacDonald, who presided over the meeting, was re-elected President of the League while Norman MacDonald of Summerside and Walter LePage of the City were also re-elected as Vice-President and Secretary respectively. The executive, which is composed of a representative from each team, is as follows: Joe Cullen (Army), Maurice Goodwin (Ray's Millionaires), Charles Linkletter (S.S. Schurman's), D. E. "Moose" Carson (R.C.A.F.), Reg. Doucette (S.D.U.) and Edwin Kelly (P.W.C.).

During the meeting, which was highly enthusiastic and well represented by the various clubs, a six-team league was developed again this year and will include four teams from the City of Saint Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College while the two team entries from Summerside will include Schurman's and R. C. A. F.

Although a proposal was made to carry on the League in two sections, with a Charlottetown division and a Summerside division, in order to cut down travelling and expenses, with the winners of both sections meeting in the finals, it was decided however to operate as one League when the Summerside representatives pointed out that it would be out of the question to floor more than two teams in that centre which would make a poor set-up for a division there.

Other decisions arrived at during the meeting included a motion to the effect that "no teams will participate in a regular League game unless there is an official referee and linesmen present to take charge of the game." It was also decided that each team will appoint two linesmen to officiate with the referee during scheduled games and that if possible, permanent referees will be appointed to officiate during the season, and otherwise, the home team will be responsible for providing the referees and linesmen.

Bruins In 3-1 Victory Over Toronto Leafs

BOSTON, Nov. 23—(AP)—Captain Milt Schmidt, the Boston Bruins' veteran centre, came up with his first goal of the current National Hockey League season to clinch a 3-1 victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs tonight before 11,744 fans at the Boston Garden.

Schmidt cast in a defensive role until last Sunday, put on one of his old time sensational solo efforts to break a 1-1 deadlock during the 10th minute of the finale.

After a scoreless first session, Johnny Peirson caged Kenney Smith's passout early in the middle session.

The two combined again after goalie Turk Brodie was yanked with 80 seconds remaining. Smith forward passed to Peirson, who out-skated several Toronto rivals before rifling a 30-footer into the empty Toronto cage.

Maple Leafs pulled into a 1-1 tie late in the second period. Sid Smith passed out to Ted Kennedy, who beat goalie Jack Gelineau.

The newly formed Island Physical Fitness Intermediate Hockey League will hold their first meeting at Summerside tonight, since it was organized there a little over a week ago. The purpose of the meeting will be to ascertain how the six clubs entered in the League are fairing out in their team development and to draft up the starting dates and schedule as well as to iron out many details which are vital to the operation of the league for the forthcoming season.

Just what other developments may come out of tonight's meeting is hard to say at the moment, as there will be many problems to be discussed and put before the meeting for discussion. At the present time there are two teams from Summerside and four from Charlottetown entered in the League and include the Summerside Crystals and R.C.A.F. and Charlottetown, A.B.U., and P.W.C., and it is expected that the opening of the League schedule will be around the first week of December.

It was reported yesterday by the Department of Physical Fitness that through the co-operation of Mr. Charles Archer, manager of the Charlottetown Forum, that arrangements have been made to procure ice time at the Forum during the first two days of the Coaches and Referees School to be held on December 9th, 10th and 11th which will be conducted by George Hayes of the N.H.L. refereeing staff and Murph Chamberlain, former N.H.L. playing star and present coach of the Sydney Millionaires of the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League.

The time will be used for carrying out the practical demonstration of refereeing and playing methods by the two instructors who will take to the ice with the attending members of the school. A special hockey game on Saturday night between two teams, the names of which have not yet been decided upon, but are expected to be released just as soon as present negotiations are completed. Both Hayes and Chamberlain are well known members of the school will take part in the refereeing and linesmen duties during the game.

The two autographed hockey sticks from the present Stampeders season, the Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League, have been received in the City and are combined with the two received from the Montreal Canadiens Hockey Club, which were received earlier in the week. The sticks will be given out to the highest bidder in the forthcoming Rotary Club auction in aid of the Crippled Children's Fund. All four hockey sticks are autographed by the various members of the two N.H.L. Clubs.

As the result of the annual meeting of the Island Physical Fitness Basketball League last night, a six-team league was developed again this year, which will consist of a two-game home and home schedule giving each team a total of 10 games to play before the playoffs are reached.

The league will get underway next Wednesday night at the Prince of Wales College Auditorium when a double bill will be played with S. D. U. and Ray's meeting in the first game and Summerside Schurman's tangling with Army in the second. The other two teams who make up the six team league are Prince of Wales College and Summerside R.C.A.F. The second round of the schedule will also get underway here the following Saturday night, although the teams playing have not been drawn up as yet.

At the close of last night's meeting, it was decided that the four City teams taking part in the league would hold a double-header exhibition hoop game at the College Auditorium this Saturday night as a warm-up to the opening of the schedule next week. P.W.C. will meet S.D.U. in the first game and with Army and Ray's meeting in the second.

Red Wings Have Hands Full Defeating Rangers

DETROIT, Nov. 23—(AP)—Detroit Red Wings, National Hockey League leaders, had their hands full tonight in burning back New York Rangers 4-3 in a thrilling game that saw the New Yorkers stage a last-period rally that just failed to gain them a tie.

It was the Detroiters' ninth successive game without a defeat and they enlarged their lead to nine points over the second-place Toronto Maple Leafs who lost to Boston tonight.

The Rangers were walloped 6-1 and 7-0 in two previous appearances on Detroit ice, but tonight they made it fight all the way.

New York played some rough and tough hockey in the opening minutes of the game and grabbed a 1-0 lead as Allan Stanley ramed home his first goal of the season.

Six penalties were called in the first period, one of them being especially costly to the Rangers as Joe Carveth ramed in a short one at the 11:20 mark to tie the score at 1-1.

The action continued hot-and-heavy in the second period which saw Detroit take a 4-1 lead on goals by Ted Lindsay, Jim McPadden and Carveth.

Midway in the final period, New York got its second goal of the night as Pentti Lund slipped one past goalie Lumley at 15:47 while

the Red Wings were a man short. They got their third goal 12 seconds later while Detroit was still minus a man, this score coming off the stick of big Ed Slowinski with Bud Polle getting the assist at 16:09.

Birkdale is near Southport on the Irish Sea. The Walker Cup matches, held every two years, were played this year at Mamaroneck, N. Y.

The Royal and Ancient also announced that the 1951 British open tournament will be played at the Royal Portrush Club in Northern Ireland, starting July 3, and the British amateur at Royal Portrush, Wales, starting May 22.

GLACE BAY, N.S., Nov. 23—(CP)—Glace Bay Miners hurdled back into the first place in the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League tonight by doubling up North Sydney Victorias 6-3.

The win advanced Miners one point ahead of Sydney Millionaires and left Vics in the cellar, one point behind Sydney. The standings will be shuffled again tomorrow night when Vics are at home to Sydney. The three clubs have been interchanging positions regularly almost since the season began Oct. 17.

Miners dug in right at the start tonight and ran up a 3-0 lead in the first period. North Sydney cupped this down to 3-2 early in the middle period but Glace Bay got three goals ahead again early in the last frame.
