MODERNISM

Sir, - After having a good dinner it has been my own to peruse your valuable paper, and going through it meet with, needless to say, many items of interest. To-day has been no exception but I must confess that for a moment I was distinctly jarred, for I ran across a particular item that was in discord with the harmony of your otherwise reasonable contributions. The one in question was, to say the least, most instructive and illuminating. It dealt with the theory of your readers may have glanced from the reading of Darwin or any other scientist of his ilk. It is quite possible to infer from the nom de plume of your correspondent that he is a student, but not from the contents of his transparent contribution. Whether he or she is a student by nature of intellect or other powers or merely a student by present occupation and the generally of his name is a question for the readers to decide. For myself I am inclined to hold the former impossible and if it happens to be the latter I would advise him to deepen the extent of his researches before parading such equivocal nonsense in the public eye under false colours.

Let us wade right into the mire and have it over with as quickly as possible, and with a few following paragraphs serving as shovelling to enable us to get out of his slough of mis-directed study. To begin with, to say that the Greeks, Romans and Egyptians were "just as fully developed as the people of the most highly civilized nations of to-day" is asinine comparison as it would be to put an ox on the same plane of equality as a car as far as transportation is concerned. Granted, that historians go into rhapsodies when writing of the Greeks or any other people of ages long since passed and granted, that in some respects they possessed some enviable attributes but at the same time we must also remember the historical bias inherent in those who uncover the dim and distant past. They are too prone to lay over-emphasis and exaggerate these attributes until they become magnified in the eyes of the uninitiated that we look upon them as unparalleled. Such, however, is far from being the true side of the case, for when we delve just slightly into these so-called higher and developed civilizations we can readily see they are of an artificial and unstable nature. For example, if "Student" happens to be of the "fair sex" she will learn with no doubt great pleasure, that a woman's place in Grecian society was strictly in the home and never out of it. Except of course in Sparta where she was treated somewhat the same as livestock. The front of the house was denied her, she kept to the backyard, her views

were never expressed nor were they asked for, neither did she dine with the head of the house nor ever come in contact with his friends. Also it will be of interest to "Student" if that person is a man, that unless he belonged to the very small minority of the population, he was a slave in every meaning of the term. He conducted commerce and made it possible for our "fully developed" Athenian full freedom to pursue his litigious course and broaden his self "mentally and physically" to the extent of theorizing but not practising. The tone of the Roman civilization may be judged by the noble and kindly acts of one Nero, their licentious living and the vicious system of slavery prevalent in their country; add to these an overwhelming egotism, a lust for conquest and an insatiable love of cruelty and you have in a nutshell our mental equals, their equality of civilizations. The Romans differed from the Greeks in some respects, notably the former possessed a more practical turn of mind. While one thought in the abstract the other acted in a practical way. However, both lacked that essential and vital element necessary for continued progress that of the combination of both theory and practice.
