Crop Conditions In Western Canada

WINNIPEG, May 29—Western crop conditions continue fairly satisfactory in all sections except the drought areas of southern Saskatchewan and Alberta. A week of widespread cool, showery weather across the Prairies extending to Swift Current, Shaunavon and Lethbridge characterized this period. Rain in south western Saskatchewan was approximated from one third to one half inch in the Swift Current-Shaunavon territory, over one inch at Lethbridge. Little relief was afforded south eastern Saskatchewan all points in that area urgently requiring more rain. In Manitoba, central and northern areas received good rains which further improved crop and subsoil moisture conditions. Scattered showers in the south following on above normal spring precipitation have created a satisfactory crop outlook at this date, according to the weekly crop report of the department of agriculture Canadian National Railways. Carman, Wawanesa, Hartney and Cromer subdivisions in Manitoba report prospects good to excellent with wheat up six inches in some sections. No damage from any source is reported.

From Portage to Dauphin weather has been cool and cloudy with plenty of moisture for the immediate present. Rossburn subdivision reports wheat up four inches with good rains since last report and conditions excellent. All subdivisions in the southeastern Saskatchewan report cool, and windy weather with soil drift damage ranging from an estimated 10 per cent to 25 per cent. Light showers from the Lampman, Avonlea subdivisions were insufficient to insure satisfactory growth.

Uneven germination is reported from many points in this dryer section. Quappelle subdivision reports conditions somewhat improved with damage from soil drift of the previous week considerably repaired with good rains over the week end. From rivers through Melville to Watrous showers to heavy rains occurred on May 19th and over the holiday week end.

Northeastern Saskatchewan similarly reports showers and cool weather with conditions satisfactory for the present. West of Saskatoon in the A. Quith, Dodsland, Rosetown subdivisions, precipitation during the week end has considerably improved the outlook. No grasshopper damage has been reported up to this date though considerable hatching is observed in interested areas.

The Prince Albert division received light to heavy showers during the week except at some northerly and northwesterly points. Subsoil moisture is still lacking in

Inferiority Complex Professor Dead

ABERDEEN, May 29 (CP)—Professor Alfred Adler, famous psychologist and originator of the phrase "Inferiority Complex," died here yesterday after collapsing in the street. He was 67 years old.

Dr. Adler, who was associated with Dr. Sigmund Freud in development of many of his behaviorist theories, had been lecturing at Aberdeen University on Psychopathology. He was picked up by a police ambulance after his collapse but died before reaching hospital.
