Largest Cattle Shipment Sails This Week

MONTREAL, April 4.—The largest number of cattle exported from Maritime ports to the United Kingdom in a week so far this year will sail from Saint John, N. B., this week.

A total of 1,650 head will be exported on three ships which leave Saint John on Thursday. The week's exports will bring the total for the year to approximately 9,513 head.

West Australia

FAVORABLE TRADE BALANCE

West Australia had a favorable trade balance of 4,896,563 in Australian currency for the year ended June 30. This included 1,941,528 pounds worth of exported gold not produced in that year.

THE GOLD YIELD

The West Australian gold yield for July was 53,585 fine ounces, worth 227,615 pounds at 4 pounds, 4 shillings, 11 1/2 pence an ounce.

RAILWAY FINANCE

The State railways, which had a loss of 379,992 pounds for the year 1930-31, finished the year ended June 30 last with a loss of only 190,069 pounds, which was no mean achievement in a period of shrinking earnings.

BUTTER EXPORT

The West Australian butter export season opened on August 8 with a shipment of 250 boxes for the London market.

WALING INDUSTRY

There is a possibility of the waling industry being revived at Point Cloates, about 700 miles north of Perth.

RECORD FRUIT SHIPMENTS

Overseas shipments of fruit from West Australia for the year ended June 30 totalled 831,915 cases, a record.

BANANA CULTURE

The banana industry is being established on the banks of the Gascoyne River, a few miles from Carnarvon, the aeroplane station on the coast, 530 miles north of Perth.

REACTIONS TO SHIPPING BILL ARE HEARD

The Senate Banking and Commerce Committee Consider Views of Various Organizations and Companies.

OTTAWA, April 4.—How varied are the reactions to the provisions of the new shipping bill was emphasized at the hearing of the Senate Banking and Commerce Committee today.

The grain growers want nothing in the bill that will place them at the mercy of the Canadian shipping interests.

The elevator companies desire the bill to insure that the maximum of Canadian grain exported, so through Canadian elevators.

The shipbuilding companies urge that only Canadian ships be allowed to engage in coastwise trade, that is trade between one Canadian port and another and that ships built in the United Kingdom bear a tariff variously suggested at from 25 per cent to 30 per cent.

OTTAWA, April 4.—(C.P.)—Prohibition of export to the United States of beer, ale, porter, wine, etc., containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight after April 6 is lifted.

off again at 1,500 feet. "While we were falling, the engines were pushed to full speed. After we gained our altitude again they were changed to standard speed. Three minutes later the air became turbulent all around us and the ship tossed violently."

"I was on the right side of the control car and supervising the rudder. Captain McCord was on the left side of the car and supervising the elevator wheel. The elevator man reported the ship was falling rapidly."

"I heard a report of 800 feet altitude. By this time the nose inclined upward about 20 degrees, but the ship was falling quite rapidly. In the fog nothing outside could be seen."

"I asked for altitude and the answer was 300 feet. I ordered all hands to stand by for a crash. That order was rung up to the engine car and almost immediately we hit the water."

"We had, as I remember, a list to starboard to my side of the control car. Water rushed in the windows on my side, carried me out the windows on the other side of the control car."

"I tried to swim away as rapidly as I could to get from under the ship, and finally came to the surface. I saw the ship drifting away as the lightning flashed. The bow was up in the air and the whole structure was a general wreck."

"I saw two lights on what I thought was the stern. On one side I saw the lights of a ship. 'I also thought I could see the glare of Barnegat Lightship. I swam toward the ship and after about 10 minutes I bumped into a board about three feet square, which I clung to the rest of the way.'

Regina Pats Lose First Title Of Junior Playoffs

Newmarket Redmen, O. H. A. Junior Champs, Edge Out Western Team 2-1 In Thrilling Battle.

By Elmer Dulmage (Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, April 4.—Newmarket Redmen, Canada-title aspirants for the first time, defeated Regina Pats, who have held the Junior championship of Canada three times, 2-1 here tonight in the first game of the Memorial Cup finals.

Packing more color than any amateur team in the east, the Redmen blazed all the speed in their game make-up for a period and a half and had enough left to stall off the Western champions in the last half of a battle that attracted a crowd of 8,250.

Led by Curly Kerr, flashing defenceman who starred with Newmarket aces, Normie Mann and Silver Doran, the Pats rushed persistently in the last period in a vain attempt to get a tying goal.

If nothing else, the assault convinced both the crowd and the Redmen that Regina will be in at the finish. The teams play the second of the best-of-three series here Thursday night.

Mann, centre-star sniper whose shots have broken up more than one battle for the Redmen, scored the only goal of the first period on a shot from outside the Regina defence. It left goalie Jimmy Franks flat-footed.

Pep Kelly made the margin two goals early in the second period, shooting in a pass from Frank Huggins. Red Strong scored the lone Pat goal just before the end of the second session on Bill Burnett's neat pass.

Newmarket held a good margin on speed, the fleet crimson forwards outskating the Pats, particularly in the first period. Doran's work stood out in the second period. Moose Stinson and Kerr provided Franks, Regina: Goal, Franks; defence, Kerr, Stinson; centre, Motter; wing, Cairns; wing, Strong; subs, Burnett, Armstrong, Cunningham, Ritzinger.
