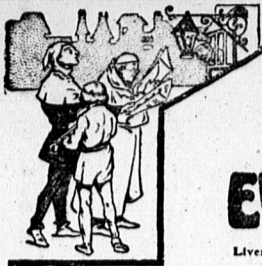

to answer the demand for several hundred creditors was living at the home of Mrs. McAdoo, the woman whose charge is now holding him for local trial, he was known as an admirer of the ladies, and was in the habit of taking his landlady and others to the local theatres, later entertaining them to a light repast or "after theatre supper." It was during these entertainments that he was exposed as being unmarried, and, according to some of the lady guests, made love to them. Along this line, according to some of those who had been his guests, his former landlady, Mrs. Ethel McAdoo, his prosecutrix at the hearing last Saturday, had a high regard for Sheldon, as he had for her.

Tuesday, P.M., March 28, 1911. Dear Mrs. McAdoo: I was hoping that after our conversation today you would withdraw the process against me. Now I am going to implore you to do so; it can do you no possible good, while it will do me infinite harm. At the same time it will delay the time when I can do for you by prejudicing me elsewhere. I have done all I possibly could for you, though with an aching heart I add I most devoutly wish it were possible to do more. If this matter in any way could bring your money back now I would not send this. Under the circumstances anyway it cannot answer the purpose of revenge, which I know is not your wish at all.

The strain which Sheldon has been under during the last week is marked on his face. He has lost weight, and already his face is coated with the pale color which is usual with men after serving long terms in prison. When Sheldon was arrested, his flesh seemed to be solid, his neck full. At the hearing on Saturday his clothing and collar seemed too large for him.

His attempts to defend himself were feeble. Detective McCaskill became disgusted with him, for the Montreal officer believed that Sheldon was a much brighter man than he displayed at the hearing. Sheldon displayed a usual knowledge of the law or the charge against him, by the way in which he conducted his cross-examination of Mrs. McAdoo and the broker who appeared against him. His questions lacked purpose, which was observed by Detective McCaskill.

"Sheldon is not bright," said Detective McCaskill, "and he displayed no unusual knowledge of the law or the charge he was given a hearing for. His questions lacked purpose on everything else to bring discredit on the witnesses." Sheldon was much put out because he was not permitted to put his witnesses on the stand. Whether he would have been able to prove anything by them is doubtful. Mrs. McAdoo made a clean straight statement of facts, which showed that Sheldon deceived her in the manner in which he was making the investments for her.

After the hearing Sheldon appeared to be "all in." He was anxious to be taken to Montreal and wanted to be released on the charge Mrs. McAdoo made against him. Attorney Eckles, who represented Mrs. McAdoo at the hearing, said he thinks that Sheldon has committed other crimes in the United States, since he left Canada, last October, and he fears that he may be called to trial for them, and may have to suffer a more severe punishment in the United States than he would be required to submit to in Canada. What little courage Sheldon did display at the hearing seemed to desert him when it was over. He seemed divested of everything, and walked in a despondent manner between Deputy Sheriff Wolf and Constable Terrell.

### DOUCETTE DISCOVERED.

MONCTON, April 6.—J. Doucette, of Rogersville, for whom his friends, aided by the Moncton police, have been searching for the past ten days, under impression that he had carried out his intention, as expressed in a letter to his wife, to commit suicide, was located last night at the home of Freeman Horsman, Mountain Road, three miles from the city. Last Saturday night Doucette was found lying on the road by Horsman with feet badly frozen. He was taken to Horsman's home, and cared for until the police tonight, learned of his whereabouts.

### HORSE NOTES OF LOCAL INTEREST

Daughters of Nutwood, 218½, have produced 19 with records of 2.10 or better, 11 of which are trotters.

The surest way for small breeders to improve their trotting stock is to save their best and most promising fillies for brood mares, and have them mated with the best stallions that their means will permit.

Brood mares that are constantly but carefully used for road purposes and light farm work will produce stronger and straighter limbed foals, and are less liable to have trouble in delivering them, than mares that do not have regular exercise.

Judging from the string which is booked to train at the Tunnel Track this summer the proprietor and his worthy assistant, Professor McVey, will not be idle. Mr. Irving's horses this season are composed of the best as usual and sure to get in the money winning heats for the season of 1911.

Kalol and Parkin are in pink of condition and will no doubt receive large share of patronage. Few people dreamed that Parkin was such a game and fearless trotter until a few weeks ago when he won his race on the ice in Charlottetown, besides he is standard bred and from the fashionably bred families.

It is Fred Warren's intention to locate at Fredericton, and open a public training stable. Mr. Warren is well and favorably known throughout the Provinces and is remembered as an excellent driver and fitter as well as a clean sport. He has a long list of record trotters and pacers to his credit having campaigned the Springhill Stables for J. R. Cowans for years.

Spurgeon Gammon, New Glasgow, speaking of Brazilian in the Horse Breeder, says in part as follows:—If we are not mistaken the Yarmouth race was the season of 1903 and Brazilian was a four-year-old. He afterwards trotted the St. Stephen race when he won his race on N.B., track and for several years afterwards the best record for that age in Canada. Brazilian made his notable campaign that year in the hands of Albert Slipp who some years afterwards drove him three winning heats over the Sussex, N.B., track in 1910, he being the first horse to beat 2.20 on the trot three times in a race in the Maritime Provinces. Brazilian also held the three-year-old record placing it at 2.33½ to a high wheel sulky over the New Glasgow track on Oct. 19, 1902. When 19 years of age he trotted a mile in public in 2.25. To date he has proven the best sire of speed that has come to our shores. When shall we look upon his like again? He was a model of a horse, perfectly gaited and dead game. Last year he had out Prince Louis (2.14) at Brockton, Mass., Baby Lewis (2.18) at Brockton, C. (2.23) that trotted one heat in 2.17½ at Halifax and was set back, Brazilian "S." went in 2.26. For pacers he had three-year-old Dominion D. (2.25½), Pretoria (2.21½), and we all saw Lina Miller (2.21½) beaten by an eyelash by Royal Night at Halifax in 2.17½ when the stallion got his mark. He also speaks at length about the gallant old Arelight (2.19½).

IMPORTANT MEASURE IN NEW BRUNSWICK

FREDERICTON, April 6.—The most important bill introduced by the Government this session was that of Surveyor General Grimmer, at an early hour this morning, with regard to the cutting of pulpwood on Crown Lands, making it necessary to manufacture it in Canada, either into pulp or paper.

Mr. Grimmer's Act will not come into force until proclaimed by the Governor-in-Council and applies only to new or renewal leases.

### QUEBEC BRIDGE CONTRACT TO BE SIGNED TODAY

OTTAWA, April 4.—The contract for the Quebec bridge will probably be signed tomorrow by the minister of railways.

Although no authoritative announcement as to the details of the contract or the successful tenderer is yet available, it is expected that the contract will, on the advice of the board of engineers in charge of the construction of the bridge, go to the St. Lawrence Bridge Company, an amalgamation of the Walkerville and the Lachine companies, which combined to tender on the work in competition with the British, German and American firms.

### PLAN GREAT RELIGIOUS MOVEMENT

LONDON, April 4.—The Archbishop of Canterbury will be asked to start a great religious movement in favor of Anglo-american arbitration. This is the outcome of a meeting held at the Mansion House at which a deputation from the Free Church Council presented a resolution urging the Lord Mayor to initiate a national movement.

The Lord Mayor said that he had received a large number of communications from various bodies, including those representing the leading municipalities, in which approval of the movement was expressed, but he added, that it was essential that the religious side of the movement should embrace all churches.

The Rev. F. B. Meyer, former President of the National Federation of Free Churches said it was obvious in order to insure success that the lead should be taken by the Archbishop, and the Anglican Church. It was then decided to present the request of the Archbishop of Canterbury in the Lord Mayor name.
