**CANADIAN AND AMERICAN DAIRIES.**

In the year 1900 Canada exported to various countries 25,259,737 lbs of butter and 183,984,430 lbs of cheese, the butter being valued at \$5,122,156 and the cheese valued at \$19,556,234, a total for butter and cheese sold abroad of \$24,678,390.

In the same year the United States exported 18,262,288 lbs of butter valued at \$3,142,378 and 48,375,862 lbs of cheese valued at \$4,930,255, and aggregate value of butter and cheese of \$8,072,633.

In other words the Canadian export of butter and cheese was more than three times as great as that of the United States. In 1895 the United States shipped to the British market 7,496,384 lbs and Canada but 4,362,288 lbs of cheese. In 1900 these figures were reversed, the United States exports having diminished to 6,277,152 lbs while Canada's export to the same market had increased to 15,491,056 lbs.

The United States is probably the greatest agricultural country in the world and it is therefore a source of just pride to the Canadian people that in the dairy industry we are not only able to compete with our enterprising neighbors but to so far surpass them as the above figures show.

This year Canadian dairy products exported are larger than ever before and will make up a value of over \$20,500,000. In the seven months of navigation there were shipped by the St. Lawrence route 2,109,171 boxes of cheese of a value of \$18,455,240, and 530,845 packages of butter worth \$8,205,044.

This takes no account of the shipments from the Maritime Provinces via St. John and Halifax. But of course the great bulk of our cheese is produced inland, about 2,500 of our 3,000 cheese factories and creameries being situated in Ontario and Quebec. Figures are rather dry reading usually, but they show in this case that Canada is emphatically the great dairy country of America, and one of the greatest in the world.

**A BRITISH DOCTRINE.**

After all, according to the New York Herald, the Monroe Doctrine is more British than American. It was conceived in England and brought forth in America. "It was, indeed, formulated by President Monroe," says the Herald, "as a result of an official desire expressed by Canning that England, as an American Power, should co-operate with the United States against the intrusion of the Holy Alliance in transatlantic affairs. The desire was conveyed by Dr. Rush, the then United States Minister in London, to President Monroe, who, after mature reflection and with the full approval of Jefferson and Madison, wrote the famous passage in his seventh annual message which is now known as the Monroe Doctrine."

The Herald also recalls with excellent good feeling the moral support which the United States received from Great Britain during the war with Spain, when all the nations of continental Europe were ranged on the other side. There is no higher statesmanship than that which concerns itself with strengthening the bonds which bind together the great nations of the Anglo-Saxon family. Such a policy is at once best for Anglo-Saxondom and the world. No one seriously apprehends that a peace which has prevailed for almost ninety years between Britain and America will be now or hereafter broken. We must all shrink from such a possibility as one of the greatest calamities that could befall the human race. "Blessed are the peacemakers" in the English speaking world, and in no other field is the execration against all who "sow discord among brethren" more justly deserved.

We know not what his friend Mr. Hinnesey will say when he learns that Mr. Dooley is married. Such is the fact, however. At New York, on December 9, Finley Peter Dunne, better known as "Mr. Dooley" was married to Miss Margaret Abbott, Rev. Father Pardow officiating. Telegrams of congratulation were received from Anthony Hope, Justin McCarthy, Sir Henry Irving, Sir Conan Doyle, and dozens of lesser literary lights on the auspicious occasion.
