THE BREAD RIOTS IN LA BELLE FRANCE

ST. QUENTIN, France Sept. 2.—Rioting which broke out here yesterday evening over the high price of food, lasted all night. A regiment of Infantry and a squadron of Cavalry were called out to quell the disturbances but were unable to cope with the mob. The Cavalry frequently charged in the crowds and several of the cavalry men were killed from their horses, and beaten. Twenty of the rioters were taken to hospitals severely injured.
