A large crowd of citizens were at the boat to see the boys off.—H. —NORBORO INSTITUTE.—The Annual Meeting of the Norboro Women's Institute was held in the school house recently. Miss McKenna presiding. After reading of minutes, etc., a report of the year's work was given as follows. We have 17 members with an average attendance of 14 members and visitors. Twelve regular meetings were held, the annual meeting in the school house at 2 p. m. the remainder of the meetings in the evening at the homes of the members. Besides the regular Institute meetings, weekly meetings were held during the winter and fortnightly ones since at which the members and others knit for the soldiers. The result of this was that 273 pairs of socks, 3 pairs of gloves and 1 pair of mittens were sent to the boys through the 105th Comfort Circle and Mrs. Hyndman. Our Institute also maintained a Prisoner of War for the year. We began the year with \$3.81 on hand. By means of an Ice Cream Social, a Parlor Social, a Lecture and collections from the district we raised our funds to \$255.11. Of this amount \$243.02 has been spent for patriotic purposes, leaving a balance on hand of \$12.09. Recently Mrs. Hugh A. —RECEIVES FORTUNE: HURRIES TO ENLIST. NEW YORK, July 28.—Having received an inheritance of about \$2,000,000 of which \$638,789.01 is in cash and the rest in gilt-edge securities, Gustave Schulman, twenty-one years old, yesterday enlisted as a private in the British army at the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission, No. 220 West Forty-second Street. "Money?" said Mr. Schulman to a recruiting officer at the mission. "What's money got to do with it? I have lots of it since I received an inheritance from my grandfather's estate a few days ago, but that doesn't make any difference, except that it makes me want to serve my country just that much more." Mr. Schulman is a British subject, a resident of Montreal, Canada. He is a grandson of the late Frederick Goldsmith, a banker and mining promoter, who lived in New York and died here four years ago, leaving an estate valued at \$15,000,000. Mr. Schulman's share was about \$2,000,000, but the will was contested and the matter has been in the courts until a few days ago, when the Supreme Court of the United States finally decided in Mr. Schulman's favor, and ordered the Riggs National Bank to turn over the bonds and cash to him.

WOULD SERVE IN PALESTINE. After that was settled and Mr. Schulman consulted with his attorneys and arranged for the proper care of his new fortune, he went straight to the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission and said that he wanted to enlist in the Jewish battalion, a unit of the British army, for service in Palestine, and asked that he be sent with the first contingent to the training camp in Canada. He tried to enlist early in June of this year—before he received his fortune—but owing to some minor eye trouble was pronounced physically unfit for service. He went to the Grady Hospital, Atlanta, Ga., where he underwent an operation on his eyes and was discharged as cured. Then he hastened to New York to enlist again, but when he arrived there he was told that he had become a man of millions. Then he took a day or two off to see that his property was safeguarded and enlisted.

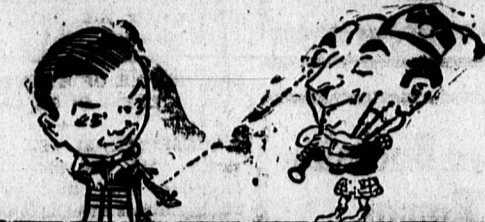

It is time enough to cross that bridge when I come to it. My only thought now is to get into the service and do what I can as a soldier."

WAR GARDEN BULLETIN. ISSUED BY CANADA FOOD BOARD. Enlist the aid of the whole family in getting your war garden vegetables canned and dried. Father helps to eat them. Why shouldn't he lend a hand in preparing them? Care should be taken to see that the fruit and vegetables you dry are young and tender. Vegetables should be cut into slices or strips from one-eighth to a quarter of an inch thick. For slicing a sharp kitchen knife or a special slicer may be used. In some cases the meatcutter answers very well. Most root vegetables should be peeled before slicing.
