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## CANADIENS CAPTURE MIDGET LEAGUE TITLE

### Rangers Forced To Accept 6-2 Defeat In Final Game Of Playoff Series

Mustering a savage third period attack to completely outplay their opponents after being held on even terms during the first two sessions, the Canadiens captured the Midget League title Saturday night at the Forum when they downed a game Ranger team 6 to 2 in the third and final game of the playoff series.

During the fateful third period the champions shot three goals, giving a display of power that left little doubt as to which team was superior but it was only during the final twenty minutes of play that they were able to overshadow their opponents. Canadiens were leading 3-2 going into the third but only after "Lady Luck" had smiled upon two of their scorers, Rangers were very much in the picture, getting two smart goals, but their ceaseless efforts in holding the winners at bay took their toll and in the final period Canadiens punched through many times and after they had counted their fourth goal to take a two point lead there was no denying them. Thereafter they held complete command.

Knowing full well the importance of the result of the crucial struggle the "kids" came through with their best performance of the season. From the opening whistle both teams attacked backcheck and then would break up plays at like demons in the net. The Canadiens looked no chances as they played their front liners nearly to the hilt. Jimmie Egan, centre, Wilson, Coyle and Steele were the shining stars in Canadiens' victory, while McLeod, Perry and Blaquiere shone brightly in the Rangers' cause. These players were a little better than the rest but each man in the game gave of his best with the rival goalies. Simmonds and McLeod performed sensationally at times on shots that, apparently, were labelled for counters.

Three times during the first period Rangers were shorthanded through penalties. On two occasions they held the anxious Canadiens at bay and at the same time went into a 1-0 lead on a beautiful single handed effort by Aubin Blaquiere. Skating down the left boards the Ranger player rounded the defence and although at a difficult angle to the net, high shot rustled the cords behind McLeod for the opening score. Previous to this Canadiens had a goal called back when one of their players was inside the crease as Roach backhanded the puck in.

Canadiens ganged desperately after the score, attempting to tie it up, but were held out. A penalty to McLeod, however, proved damaging to the firing Ranger team and the winners took exactly 38 seconds to go into a 2-1 lead. On their first attack McDonald let drive from the line to trickle one into the Ranger cage and then a sweet three man passing attack territory carried inside Ranger goal. Roach carried inside Ranger territory before feeding a short pass to Coyle; the latter marked closely slid the puck to Wilson skating toward the net and Wilson made no mistake as he hammered the disc home. It was the spectacular save by McLeod of McLeod kept the winners ahead.

### Minor Changes In Cardinal 1936 Lineup

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BRADENTON, Fla., March 8.—As they limber up here under a broiling tropical sun, St. Louis Cardinals are using rose colored glasses.

The rank and file of the players think they're going to gallop through the National League to their second pennant in three years. They expect a more or less hot fight from the champion Chicago Cubs and New York Giants; but they believe they have the power and the pitchers to come through.

At this writing, neither of the Dean brothers, around which manager Frankie Frisch expects to build his pitching staff, have come into the fold, but their signing is regarded as a certainty.

Although he feels he has the best starting team the Cardinals have presented in a good many seasons, Frisch said today he must develop infield and outfield strength.

With one or two minor changes the Cardinals will be the same swashbuckling crew that won the 1934 pennant and finished a nose behind the Cubs last year.

The hard-hitting Rip Collins will guard first base. Manager Frisch and Leo Durocher will take care of second and short. Charley Gelbert, the "man who came back," will succeed Pepper Martin at the hot corner. Gelbert is playing with all his old time skill after a long lay-off due to a gunshot wound.

The slugger Joe Medwick will patrol left. Terry Moore is slated for centre and the redoubtable Martin will go back to his old post in right.

With Bill Delancey, first string catcher, in Arizona and lost to the club for the season most of the backstopping will fall on the shoulders of Virgil Davis, who batted .298 for Columbus in the American Association last season, has the inside track for the second string job.

Frisch believes Roy Parmelee, big right-hander, who came to the Cardinals in a trade with the Giants during the winter, will add a tower of strength to the hurling corps. Parmelee is ranked as the no. three starting pitcher, behind the two Deans.

Bill Walker, who won 13 and lost eight last season, will be the fourth starter and the fifth will come from "Wild Bill" Hallahan, Ed Heusser or Mike Ryba, the one-man ball team from Columbus. Ryba won 20 and lost eight last year.

Belted Hero's condition was revealed yesterday in the Linfield racing. The six-year-old gelding was among the also-rans in the Shampadale, three-mile chase. Belted Hero had started at odds of 9 to 4.

Reynoldstown, favorite in the Grand National in the latest callings, won the race from a field of 15. Three lengths back came Southern Hero. Buckthorn was third, a length and a half back. Reynoldstown, owned by Major Noel Furlong, started at 3 to 1, while the other places were both quoted at 100 to 8.
