Florence Nightingale gave up all ease and pleasure of life that her own charm and wit could add to wealth, social position and a cultural education of rare thoroughness for an ideal of goodness worked out in sheer self sacrifice. She devoted herself unflinchingly to service for others. No task was too hard or too menial for the gently bred woman, who in London, Paris, Rome had always the most brilliant social world at her feet. A character of marvellous creative and executive intelligence, she was driven by a powerful force within herself—the force of altruistic service.

Erected at the entrance of the Laboratory of the Prince Edward Island Hospital is a plaque bearing the following inscription—

The Rena McLean Memorial X-Ray Laboratory
Founded in memory of Nursing Sister Rena McLean who went to her death in the sinking of the Hospital Ship Llandovery Castle—June 27, 1918.

Here was a courageous soul fully exemplifying the great principles of service and sacrifice. Highly educated, the possibilities of great social achievement within her reach, Rena McLean relinquished the abundant comforts of home, disdained a life of easy pleasure, and in the noble pursuit of helpfulness to others attained her crowning glory in the World War. Her life and death alike symbolize the nursing sisterhood the high purpose, the lofty ideals, and the reliance of service so fully inherent in the vocation to which you have been called.

A very fine programme was presented to supplement the exercises which was as follows: Violin solo, "Blue Bells of Scotland," Miss Thelma Teed; vocal solo, "Villanelle," Mrs. F. H. Trainor; vocal solo, selected, Mr. Charles Earle; reading, "Nora Has Her Picture Took," Miss Mary Sinclair; vocal duet, selected, Messrs Quigley and Dingwall; vocal duet, "I Would That My Love," Mrs. Fletcher and Miss L. Rev. Quincy A. McDowell was re-elected Moderator for the ensuing six months. Mr. McDowell as Moderator requested that the records of all the sessions be brought to the Presbytery on the third Tuesday in July for examination.

Some time was spent on the budget. The evening session took the form of a Communion service. Rev. Quincy A. McDowell presided and the address was given by Rev. M. Scott Fulton, the other Ministers present taking part and also a number of the Elders. The service was an inspiring and helpful one.

The Presbytery then adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and Clerk, of which public intimation is given. The meeting was closed with benediction by the Moderator.

ment Control. The Canadian government has already taken many steps, the letter stated, the practical effect of which has been to assist the enforcement officials of the United States. In the Conference held recently in Ottawa the representatives of the United States frankly and cordially recognized the co-operation of the Dominion. By an Act of 1927, bonding requirements have been established which have almost completely stopped the practice of liquor-laden vessels coming into Canadian ports for provisions, shelter, or repairs, and afterwards proceeding again to sea. Exporters are no longer permitted to place imported liquors in bonded warehouses to await a convenient opportunity for shipment into the United States, and by June 11, 1930, all existing stores in such warehouses must be disposed of. The Importation of Intoxicating Liquor Act of 1928, has forbidden the importation of this class of goods except when consigned to His Majesty or one of the Provincial Government agencies.

The following resignations were tabled to go into effect in June next, the first being Rev. Hammond Johnston of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown. Dr. Ayers and Mr. D. A. Bruce moved and seconded, and Dr. Ramsay supported, a very warm and appreciative resolution regarding Mr. Johnston's personality and work in Charlottetown.

Rev. David Coburn intimated his resignation from Bradalbane charge. Mr. MacKay expressed the real sorrow of the Bradalbane people at Mr. Coburn's decision. Mr. Coburn came at a very difficult time and has performed a very important work there.

Rev. S. B. Profit presented his resignation from O'Leary charge. Mr. Profit intends pursuing further studies. Mr. MacMahon intimated that the congregation was desirous to retain Mr. Profit as their minister, and the matter was left over in the meantime. An effort will be made to secure suitable supply and grant Mr. Profit a year's leave of absence.

Presbytery was gratified to learn that under an urgent appeal from his congregation Rev. John Stirling has decided to remain in Montague. Messrs. Fraser and Bulpitt expressed their gratification at Mr. Stirling's decision.

2.—That the familiar harmonies be restored to some old tunes.
3.—That marks of expression and metronome marks be inserted.
4.—That prose psalms and scripture passages be added at the end of the book.

5.—That the position of the metrical psalms be left to the discretion of the Hymn Book Committee.
6.—That selections from the Ritual be incorporated at the back of the book.

7.—That the new book be enlarged to include many of the familiar hymns.
8.—It is recognized that the Hymn Book Committee are preparing a Book of Prose which will contain the best of the hymns in the existing books and adding also a number of hymns which have secured a deserved place in the Hymnology of the Church Universal.

Communications were read from Wellington, asking that their clergy be restored to its former status and that Rev. Mr. McGowan be continued as its minister. Hon. B. W. LePage, George J. Tweedy, from Trinity, Charlottetown; T. Moyle, Bedouque; R. C. McLeod, Valleyfield; George E. Brown, Kensington; Hooper Linkletter, Summerside.

Mr. Moyle and Mr. Lockberre representing the Temperance Alliance, spoke to the court on the forthcoming Plebiscite. A wide-spread effort is being made to convince the public that Prohibition is a failure, and should be replaced by some form of more fair and careful comparison between conditions in our own province and the provinces now under "Government Control."

It is expected that the Brewers Association will make a determined effort to win out in Prince Edward Island. A victory over Prohibition here would greatly influence the forthcoming vote in Nova Scotia. If the policy is adopted here which has been followed in other places, the public of P. E. I. may expect immediately before voting day—a flood of literature calculated to influence voters against Prohibition. The Temperance Alliance is preparing for the campaign and the friends of Prohibition are asked to give the Alliance both moral and financial support.

The following resolution presented by Rev. J. M. MacLeod was unanimously adopted by Presbytery: "We as a Presbytery place ourselves on record, as being strongly in favor of Prohibition and urge that the people of the United Church stand shoulder to shoulder in the coming campaign that the banner of Prohibition which has been over us since 1901 may still cover us with its protecting folds."

The Rev. John Sterling of Montague was unanimously elected as Chairman of Presbytery for the ensuing year. Rev. W. E. Aitken was re-elected Secretary and Rev. J. M. MacLeod as Treasurer.

The Rev. John Stirling of Montague was elected Chairman for the ensuing year. The present Secretary and Treasurer were re-elected.

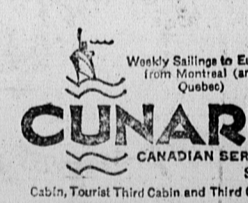
