Two Canadian Jesuits Killed By Japanese

PEKING, Oct. 29.—(CP-Havas)—Reports from Suchow in Kiangsu Province, said today two Canadian Jesuit missionaries were shot and wounded by a Japanese sentry Saturday at a village 10 miles southwest of Suchow. The names of the Jesuits were not given. Japanese army sources claimed the missionaries were shot in error. One of them, the report said, is in a critical condition.
