SUGAR PRICES.—The St. John Telegraph of Monday says: "The prospects are that sugar will be advanced still further. Much depends on developments on the raw sugar market in New York, where a rise is expected. At present refined sugar is bringing twenty-one cents a pound, less five per cent. to wholesalers, at the refineries in St. John, Halifax and Montreal, while the price of raw sugar stands approximately at twenty-two cents; the United States refineries are getting from twenty-two and one-half to twenty-four cents, less two per cent. The supplies which the public have been receiving were refined from raw sugar purchased some time ago. While the old stock lasts prices will remain the same. A rise would hit the industrious housewife hard in the middle of the preserving season. The raw sugar market has been fairly steady for the last ten days but the future is somewhat uncertain and refiners are watching closely for the direction in which the change is likely to take place. A rise would be reflected almost immediately in the prices of the refined article here, while a drop would have to be very considerable before a decline in the price of Canadian refined sugar would be possible. The indications are that the Canadian refineries will have to put their prices up, but no definite statement can be made at this time."

Interesting Pictures of Old Charlottetown Given to Orphanage Mr. R. K. Brace has presented to the P. E. I. Protestant Orphanage four decidedly interesting historical paintings of Charlottetown, about seventy years ago, the work of the late George Hubbard. One of these, painted in 1849, shows the Government House, the powder magazine on the barracks ground, the flagstaff, McLean's copper shop and dwelling, Powna Street and the old Rankin House. Powna wharf showing the ship Castilia and the brig Fanny, which took the Islanders to California, also the steamer which conveyed mail to Pictou, Yates' auction stand with Mr. Dalrymple leaning against Purdie's warehouse at the head of the wharf and the Catholic chapel. Another picture made by Mr. Hubbard while sitting at the London House corner, (now the Royal Bank) shows the old round Market House the Colonial Building, the Church of England, and the flour market (now the Bank of Nova Scotia). The third was painted in 1844 from Thompson's and shows the building built by Chief Justice Jarvis, the old Roman Catholic Chapel on the corner of Great George and Sydney Streets, the Church of England, situated where the Court House now is. The fourth was painted in 1849 and shows the old Kirk, the Roman Catholic Chapel, the Provincial Building, the Zion Church, the roof of the Methodist Church and the Church of England.

REMODELLING HOUSE.—Mr. E. M. Best has the contract of remodeling house on Grafton Street for Mr. John E. Cameron. It is being converted into a two family flat, with nine rooms upstairs and the same number below. This will be the first two family flat similar to those in the larger cities to be erected here although there are a number of apartment houses. Both the upstairs and downstairs will be similar throughout. The building measures 22 x 60 feet and the front will be set off with an enclosed verandah of cement. Both parlors have a very pretty fireplace, with mantel above running the width of the room with inset book cases beneath.

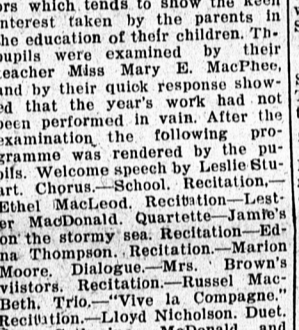
