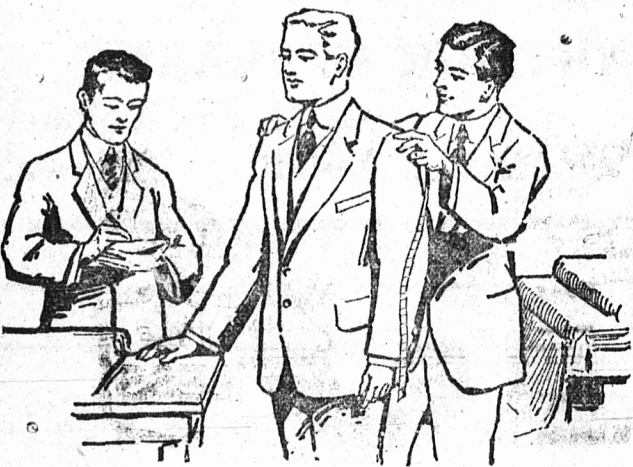

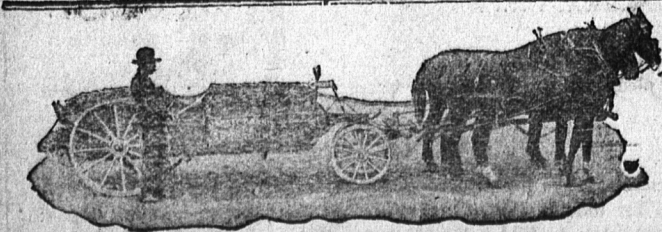

FOOT AMPUTATED.—A telegram received from this City from the Adjutant General contains the information that Private David Fanning, of Charlottetown, reported wounded in the left foot a short time ago, has had the foot amputated in a hospital in France. The condition of the patient is reported as serious. It is a remarkable coincidence that this same leg was broken twice on different occasions several years ago. Much sympathy is felt for the parents of the unfortunate young man but it is to be hoped that reassuring news regarding his condition will soon be received.

WOUNDED NOT KILLED.—The report in Saturday's issue that Sergeant John Nicholson of Hazel Grove had been killed in action happily proves to be an error. It appears however that he has been wounded. He is a son of Mr. Angus Nicholson of Hazel Grove and enlisted in the 26th Battalion at St. John. He is about 25 years of age. In the list of casualties copied from an exchange the same day, the name of Gunner Malcolm C. McAulay appeared among those who died from wounds. This also fortunately appears to be an error caused from a transposition of the type in the list of killed and wounded.
