MARKET GOSSIP

B. C. Forbes on the outlook says:—My opinion still is that stocks purchased with discrimination during and since the panic will sell at substantially higher prices during 1930. It is not too late to pick up investment stocks—or speculative stocks, also, for that matter—on attractive terms. Irregularity will be logical but the longer trend cannot well fail to be towards higher levels for security prices.

Reduction in Price of Crude Oil The slashing of crude oil prices due to an asserted overproduction of crude petroleum and gasoline was extended this week to Pennsylvania and Kentucky and became general in the mid-continents and southwestern fields. Prices of Pennsylvania grade were cut 25 cents a barrel which brings it to the lowest levels since December 3, 1927.

Such action is responsible for the easing off in Imperial Oil and International Petroleum as both are adversely affected on account of the

latter company selling a great deal of its crude oil in the United States market. Standard Oil of New Jersey initiated the price reductions on January 15th in an effort to force further curtailment of crude production and a decrease in gasoline before the summer season. The shares of the International Petroleum Company have been under pressure of late and the steady liquidation has been, it is reported, for the account of one of the mining houses which has recently found the going hard.

Paper Stocks

The strength in the newsprint stocks are attributed to the belief that something of a constructive nature was in the making. Whether this refers to the Hearst contract or the prospects of increasing the price of newsprint for the last half of 1930, could not be ascertained. The Abitibi issues were the leaders and some attach a considerable amount of importance to the well founded belief that this company's forthcoming annual report is expected to reveal earnings the equivalent of \$1.50 a share on the common.

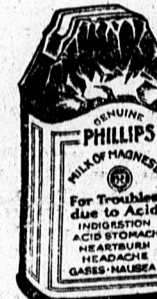
