THE LATE MRS. J. B. TRAVERS

Many friends learned with deep regret, (says St. John Telegraph Journal) the death of Mrs. Sarah B. Travers, wife of Dr. J. Boyce Travers, assistant superintendent of the Provincial Hospital, Lancaster. She passed away on Friday, at her home, 76 Lancaster Avenue, after an illness of some weeks and her death will be mourned throughout a wide circle.

Mrs. Travers was very active in the work done during the strenuous days of the Great War in connection with the I. O. D. E. She was interested deeply, as well in other women's activities and was prominent in the organization of the Women's Hospital Aid. She was a member of St. Andrew's church and a devoted worker in connection with its activities.

Mrs. Travers was a daughter of the late Rev. Dr. James Bennett, one of Saint John's most famous

divines, who was for many years minister of St. John's Presbyterian church, King street East.

In addition to her husband, Mrs. Travers is survived by a son, Frank Young of Strathmore, Alberta; a stepson, J. Rochester Young of Winnipeg, and three sisters, Mrs. J. A. Beak of Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. J. E. B. McCready of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and Mrs. A. L. Spear of Fort Fairfield, Maine.

The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock from her late residence and interment was in Fernhill.

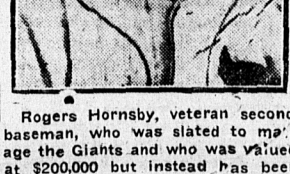
