Sir,—Three things are fairly obvious to anyone who will really think, name—y—1. That to win out in our war for freedom we Canadians have got to shake off our lethargy. We are still to a great extent "A SLEEPING PEOPLE"; we MUST WAKE UP, and get alive to the fact that we shall have to MOBILIZE AS A NATION, and probably to strain every nerve and muscle, if victory is to crown our fight.

2. That this calls for SPIRITUAL as well as material and physical effort. THE CALL TO REPENTANCE and PRAYER has been sounded from some of our churches; not from all. A considerable section of our clergy has shown GOLF WATER on the FIRE OF FREEDOM. If these "Shepherds of His flock" will get the spirit into them as described by the Prophet JOEL in his second chapter, perhaps they may yet get ready (before it is too late) to "BLOW THE TRUMPET IN ZION", cease from tending the air and spilling good words with words of WEAKNESS and of LITTLE FAITH, and "LEND THEIR HEARTS AND NOT THEIR GARMENTS." Let the ministers of the Lord weep between the porch and the altar, and turn away from their altars; let them let them "GATHER THE PEOPLE SANCTIFY THE CONGREGATION, and send them out to what they know in their hearts is a "HOLY WAR."

3. That God requires of men THREE THINGS only (Micah 6:8). That the FIRST is JUSTICE; the second MERCY; and the third—REALITY. With these FACTS in mind, I have written the enclosed four VERSES. They are written by the officer who had the chief responsibility between 1914 and 1918 in mobilizing an sending overseas over 55,000 men from British Columbia and the Yukon.

Allies Must Win Or Force Will Rule

HALIFAX, Nov. 30.—The British Empire does not want to adopt a policy of appeasement, says Sir George Campbell said here tonight, but "we must prevail or brute force will turn the world into a jungle." Sir Gerald, British High Commissioner to Canada, was the speaker at the St. Andrew's Day banquet of the North British Society of Halifax.

He condemned Germany for the way the Nazis were conducting the war. "Not so much because of the way they are sinking our shipping with illegal mines, breaking international law, that is to be expected, we are at war with them—but because neutral nations are suffering with us." A good percentage of shipping sent to the bottom was that of neutral nations.

He branded Hitler as a liar. "Allice in Wonderland said 'anything I say three times is true.' Hitler in plunderland says 'anything I say three times is a lie.'" Sir Gerald believed the world might not have been at war today if Hitler had not resorted to lie after lie in his international dealings.

The Treaty of Versailles was "curious" in many respects he said, but many of the acts of Hitler were more "curious." Hitler brought back to the fatherland Germans that had settled other lands generations back, yet he proposed to be fighting for "elbow room" for the Germans already there.

Tribute to the air and naval forces was paid by Sir Gerald. It was good to know our airmen and their machines have proved superior to the Germans' and that our navy has controlled the submarine menace." It was good to have "success instead of failure at the first."

And Scotland's men were living up to their reputation of "being the life of the party—that some one else is giving." All over the world Scotsmen had answered the call "Scotland in danger," Sir Gerald said, and once again they were marching to the defence of their country.

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Boyce and Mr. Jay and all those taking part by Mr. John H. Court was seconded by Miss Ruth Trainor. Mrs. (Rev.) S. J. Boyce gave a vote of thanks to Mrs. Ellis on her "True To Life" reading. The lecture was closed by singing God Save the King.

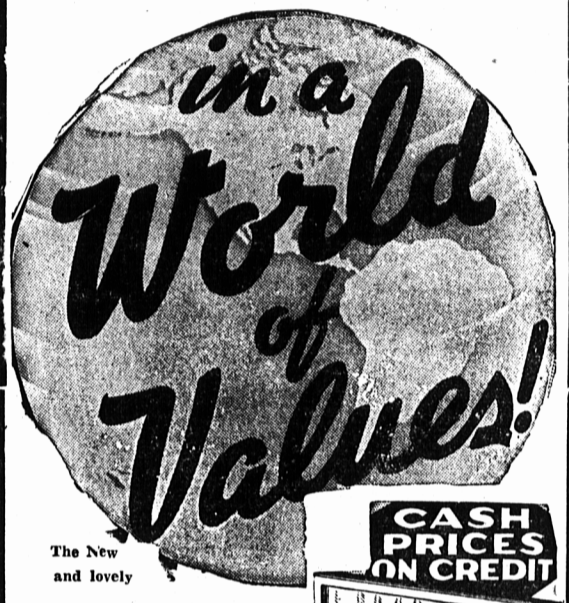

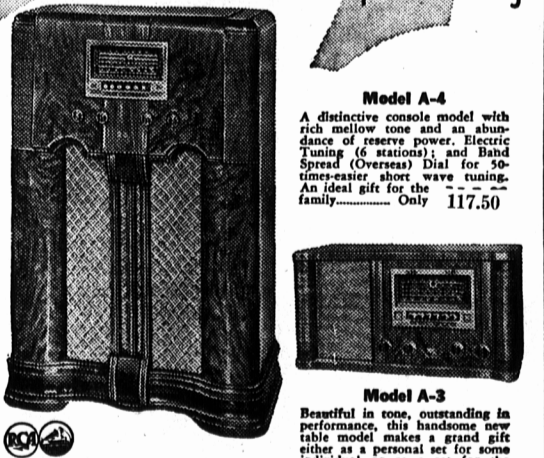
