BRITAIN SOUNDS WARNING IN SPANISH CRISIS

CHAUTEMPES CALLED TO FORM NEW MINISTRY

Neutrality Body Not Functioning Properly Claim

Continued Flow Of Arms To Spanish Belligerents May Result In Changed British Policy.

(By The Canadian Press)
Great Britain before the Non-Intervention Committee last night said through its spokesman that "the present state of affairs is thoroughly unsatisfactory" as the Committee has failed to receive through cooperation and to keep arms and men from reaching either side of the Spanish civil war.
The Committee decided to seek aid from non-European nations in its work.
Meanwhile hints seeped from Germany that the Reich might take action against the Spanish Government in retaliation for an attack she charges Spanish submarines made on the German Cruiser Leipzig last week. Valencia has denied the charge.
The German Government announced Foreign Minister Von Neurath would not go to London Wednesday as planned, due to the seriousness of the situation. The press thundered against the "Red Pirates," their frequent description of the Valencia, Spanish, Government. Berlin said it has positive proof of the attack.

BLUM SEEKS TO RALLY SUPPORT OF SOCIALISTS

Political Crisis Reported To Have Little Effect On Normal Life Of Capital.

PARIS, June 21—(CP-Havas)—Fate of Senator Camille Chautemps' attempt to form a new Popular Front Government appeared tonight to depend on whether former Premier Blum can persuade the Socialist National Congress, which meets tomorrow, to support the Premier-Designate.
Chautemps is a Radical Socialist and some Leftists thought Blum's followers might prove reluctant to support a government under the direction of a moderate. The general impression was, however, Chautemps would obtain the support he needs.

Main Problem
It was believed that Chautemps' main problem, if he wins Socialist support, would be to secure some assurance of senatorial cooperation in working out of the financial impasse.
Reports published abroad concerning the political situation, especially references to abnormal troop movements in the city, were characterized by officials as distortions of the situation.
The political crisis had no apparent effect on the normal life of the capital. Certain precautions were however instituted in connection with the expected building workers' strike, having no relation to the political situation.

May Bridge Gap
After protracted negotiations, which began long before dawn and continued until 7.30 p.m. when he reported to President Lebrun at the Elysee Palace, the Radical-Socialist Leader expressed the opinion the financial impasse which wrecked the previous Government could be solved in a manner satisfactory to all groups.
Senator Chautemps, premier twice before, seemed assured of support from his Radical-Socialist colleagues. The National Council of the Socialist Party was to meet tomorrow to decide whether it also would back Chautemps, who had the goods' leaders of ex-Premier Leon Blum.
Socialists warned the Premier-Designate that "there is only one possible government—a"

Miners Vote To Return To Work

STELLARTON, N. S. June 21—Stellarton and Acadia miners employed by the Acorn Coal Company voted almost two to one today to return to work as soon as the collieries affected by their 21-day strike would be re-opened by the company. The vote was 632 to 323.
The 1,100 Stellarton workers employed in the Allan, Albion, MacGregor and Moss Collieries, struck May 30 for a 71-cent per day increase in pay. Four hundred Thorburn men went out the next day.

National Gift Is Sequel To Baldwin's Statesmanship

LONDON, June 21—(CP)—Stirred by the manner in which former Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin handled the abdication crisis of last December, an anonymous donor gave £250,000 almost \$1,250,000 to the Empire, members of the House of Commons disclosed today.
The gift was for the purpose of "endowing any object best calculated to strengthen still further" the ties of the Empire. It was accepted by the former Prime Minister before he resigned to become the Earl of Baldwin.
The money will be administered as an Imperial trust.
No hints leaked out as to the giver. He said he wanted to make a "thanks offering" for Baldwin's

Germany Said Planning To "Avenge" Alleged Attack

Rumored Reich To Employ "Military Action More Drastic Than It's Fleet Bombardment Of Almeria" In Leipzig Incident

PARIS, June 21—(CP)—The Havas News Agency, in a despatch from Berlin tonight, said rumors were current in diplomatic circles in the German Capital that Germany would "avenge" the alleged attack on its Cruiser Leipzig "by military action more drastic than its fleet's bombardment of Almeria."
Almeria was shelled May 31 by four German warships following the bombardment of the German Pocket Battleship Deutschland by Spanish Government airplanes May 29 at Iviza, Balearic Islands.
The despatch stated the rumor was linked to the abrupt postponement of the official visit to London planned by Foreign Minister Von Neurath.
"The moderate tendency in evidence after the bombardment of Almeria," the despatch said, "has been replaced by a new rage of irritation which appears ready to burst out in action outside normal diplomatic channels."
"The Diplomatic und Politische Korrespondenz, semi-official organ of the Reich Foreign Office, said bluntly tonight that in order to teach a lesson to the desperadoes and pirates of Valencia," there was no other means available than a military blow which would weaken their position already precarious.
"Some circles considered that the French political crisis, and above all the execution of the eight Red Army generals in Russia, influenced the swing toward a strong attitude which had already begun in Hitler's immediate entourage."
"They therefore raise the question whether Hitler has decided, before sending Von Neurath to London, to present Great Britain with another accomplished fact like the bombardment of Almeria."
In Berlin it was announced Baron Von Neurath, foreign minister, would delay his scheduled visit to London because of the situation created by alleged Spanish submarine attacks on the Leipzig. The Spanish Government at Valencia denied such attack; had taken place.

Lauds Russian Transpolar Fliers

OTTAWA, June 21—"A wonderful piece of navigation," said Transport Minister C. D. Howe, commenting today on the feat of the Soviet aviators whose Moscow to San Francisco non-stop flight ended yesterday at Vancouver Barracks Airport, Washington.
Mr. Howe said he had heard no details of the flight but was impressed with the enterprise of the men who attempted the trans-polar dash for a non-stop record, and was delighted when they successfully accomplished the most difficult stage, although they fell short of their objective.
"It was such a gift as would particularly appeal to Lord Baldwin. During the difficult years after the Great War he gave one-fifth of his entire fortune to the nation anonymously. It later came out that the gift and an appeal to other wealthy men to do similarly, to reduce the national debt, were by Baldwin. That gift was of £150,000.
Baldwin's speech to the House of Commons announcing the events that led up to Edward VIII's abdication has been ranked with the greatest speeches in English history."

INSURGENTS PUSH TOWARDS SANTANDER

Basque Troops Reorganized For Last Stand On Native Soil.

BANOS DE CARRANZA, Spain, June 21—(AP)—The Basque Government gathered troops for a last stand on native soil tonight to save Santander from the fate of Bilbao as insurgent warplanes and vessels at sea heavily bombarded coastal areas.
Insurgents, seeking to force Basque President Jose Antonio Aguirre and the remnants of his army to abandon their homeland, bombarded this small sulphur bath town near the border of Santander Province, causing considerable damage.
The Basque Government, however, continued to reorganize troops in an effort to check an insurgent advance on Santander, about 45 miles west of Bilbao.
Basque resistance to the new insurgent push was hampered by thousands of refugees who fled toward Santander from the conquered capital.

CONSOLIDATE FORCES

Basques consolidated their weary and hungry forces a few miles west of Bilbao in the vicinity of Baracaldo and Alonsotegi and in this town on the Bilbao-Santander railway line.
The road from Bilbao to Santander still was filled with caravans of refugees.
The Basque Government charged in a statement that insurgents had bombed and machine-gunned the refugees, causing heavy casualties.
Basque officials said abandonment of Bilbao was ordered because it was impossible to continue the struggle without aid of an air force, which they vainly hoped would be sent by the Spanish Government at Valencia.

FIGHT TO THE END

VALENCIA, June 21—(CP-Havas)—The Spanish Government undaunted by the insurgent capture of Bilbao, tonight proclaimed a fight to the end, "until we have conquered the last disintegrating and expelled forces of foreign invaders from our country's soil."
"Bilbao was evacuated, but the Euzkadi (Basque people) have not been conquered," the Government said.

Plans Rest Before Continuing Flight

BANDOEING, Dutch East Indies, June 21—(AP)—Amelia Earhart decided today to take a three-day rest and have her plane overhauled before taking off on the next leg of her flight around the world.
She landed at Bandoeing today after a flight from Singapore over the Java Sea. After her plane is checked she plans to take off for Darwin, Australia.

Prize Awarded Italian Spanish War Ace

ROME, June 21—(AP)—An Italian ace in the Spanish Insurgent air corps was designated today by the Air Ministry, which Premier Mussolini heads, as recipient of the annual Francesco Barraca aeronautical prize.
He is lieutenant Adriano Mantelli who volunteered in the Insurgent air force and has brought down 22 Government planes.

Three Are Killed In Ontario Plane Crash

ST. MARY'S, Ont., June 21—(CP)—A broken wing spar was advanced as one reason tonight for the airplane crash which took the lives today of three men—Belleville pilot and his two Toronto passengers.
The crash from 1,000 feet to a wheat field on the Deeward farm, eight miles from this Perth County town, brought death to Pilot Arthur Levens, one-time aerial "burnstormer," Charles Sackett and Al Ogden both connected with the Murray Aeronautical Corporation of Toronto.
Collapse of one wing of the Puss Moth monoplane which sent it hurtling to the ground could be caused by the snapping of a spar, in the opinion of aviation men who visited the scene, where the mangled bodies of the three men were found in the splintered wreckage.

QUIET REIGNS IN TRINIDAD OILFIELDS

Oilous Tension Follows Renewal Of Bloodshed When Police Fire On Mob.

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, June 21—(CP cable)—Ominous quiet prevailed tonight over the Trinidad oilfields where two workmen and a boy were killed this morning as police fired on a mob of striking United British Oil Company employees, as the strikers closed in to attack them at the Point Fortin oil field.
Twenty were wounded in today's encounter. The mob fled after the police fired upon them, but 1,000 strikers paraded San Fernando streets this afternoon, disrupting all work. No further violence was reported.

Flee Towards City

Wives of European employees of the oil companies were reported to be fleeing toward Port of Spain. Employees at the Apex oil field also struck early today, stopping all work on the Pith Lake.
Today's deaths bring the total toll exacted since the strikes began Saturday to five. William Bradburn, 26-year old police official, and a Port of Spain police corporal were victims of the strikers' clubs and hatchets in Saturday's seven-hour riot. At least 50 were injured in the first riots.

Widely Sought

Meanwhile, Uriah Butler, colored labor organizer, was the object of one of the Island's most intensive manhunts as police searched for him in connection with Saturday's riots.
The arrival of a police squad to arrest Butler on charges of agitation precipitated the seven-hour battle in which two were killed and more than 50 injured, as laborers fought police with clubs, cutlasses and hatchets.
Reported refusal of company officials of United British and Kern Oil Companies to allow food-laden lorries to enter the Fyzabad area added another phase to the already ominous situation in the strike-ridden region.

Trials To Follow Closing Of Catholic Schools By Nazis

MUNICH, Germany, June 21—(AP)—The Nazi Regime tonight announced new "immorality" trials of Catholics would show justification for its drastic action against Catholic schools in Bavaria.
Adolf Wagner, Bavarian Minister of the Interior who yesterday announced the closing of 11 private Catholic schools, declared the public would know the reason for this "when the trials begin."
Outwardly, the schools were unchanged today, with the same teachers handling the same subjects. Already under control of the Bavarian Ministry of Education, the schools have had teachers who were certificated and paid by the state.

FEAR VIOLENCE ON REOPENING STEEL PLANTS

(AP, By Guardian's Special Wire, YOUNGSTOWN, O., June 21—In a desperate 11th hour appeal to President Roosevelt, C. I. O. leaders tonight begged him "in the name of God" to halt a back-to-work march into four strike-seged steel mills set for 7 a. m. tomorrow.
"Any attempt to open the mills" will automatically bring "in the name of God" a renewed battle between C. I. O. pickets and police at the Republic Steel Plant.

CRITICAL HOUR

"In the name of God and the overwhelming majority of steel workers of Youngstown we urge you to immediately intervene in this critical hour and avoid a calamity and disaster that Ohio may remember."

MACHINE-GUNNED REFUGEES

The Basques charged a fleet of nearly 100 insurgent planes machine-gunned refugees fleeing Bilbao on the road to Santander while insurgent ships kept up a steady bombardment, inflicting heavy casualties.
Insurgents established military rule in Bilbao, restored water and gas service and brought in food supplies for that city's 300,000 hungry inhabitants.
In the south, Government troops intensified their drive against insurgents at Huesca, apparently in an effort to offset in some degree the fall of Bilbao.

Situation Unsatisfactory

LONDON, June 21—(AP)—The 27-nation European Non-Intervention Committee decided tonight to seek aid from non-European countries after a British declaration that the Committee had failed thus far to keep arms from either side in the Spanish civil war.
The British stand regarding the "present state of affairs as thoroughly unsatisfactory" was believed by some observers to be a veiled threat to quit the "Hands Off Spain" alliance.
The Earl of Plymouth, chairman and British representative on the Committee, told a sub-committee session that efforts must be intensified to halt the flow of munitions to the civil war combatants.
"If there is no early evidence of such cooperation," he warned, "the British Government would feel bound to take this fact into account in giving further consideration to the situation."
Thereupon the sub-committee agreed to solicit aid from non-
