KING GEORGE IS THREATENED BY SUFFRAGETTES

LONDON, Feb. 4-Threats from militant suffragettes that they will mob King George on Monday if his speech at the opening of Parliament does not indicate a wish that the franchise be granted to women, resulted in extraordinary police activity today.

The parliament buildings will be surrounded by the largest number of police that has ever been called out at the opening of parliament. Fear over the suffragettes question is causing the authorities as much worry as the anarchists. There are now said to be more than 200 members of continental anarchist bodies under secret arrests, and more are being taken into custody daily.

According to one report which reached the police today leaders of the suffragettes have purchased a large supply of locks and chains, planning to lock themselves to the seats if they are able to make their way past the guards.

WANT ALL WOMEN HOUSEHOLDERS ENFRANCHISED

LONDON, February 3-The suffragette members of parliament of all parties met and resolved to move for the introduction of a modified conciliation bill at the present session. The bill will be mainly the same as that of last year, but will be amended so as to enfranchise all women householders. The title will also be changed.

TO COMPEL INSURANCE AGAINST UNEMPLOYMENT

LONDON, February 3-The government hopes at the coming session of parliament to pass the bill for compulsory insurance against unemployment. This will be put into effect next January and it will be experimental, to be applied to 2,500,000 skilled and unskilled workmen in the building, shipbuilding and engineering trades, and administered through the labor exchanges. The men are to contribute approximately sixpence weekly, the employers and the state contributing the same amount. Unemployed persons will receive about ten shillings a week.

ENTERS SUIT FOR CRIPPLEN'S ESTATE

LONDON, Feb. 1-In the probate court today counsel for Mrs. Theresa Hunn, of Brooklyn, N. Y., a half-sister of the late Mrs. Hawley Crippen, better known as Belle Elmore, has applied for letters of administration of the estate of the murdered actress, whose husband was hanged for the crime on November 23 last. The application states that the estate consists of jewelry, furs and cash, and amounted to about \$875. Counsel for Mrs. Hunn contended that Dr. Crippen, who made a will in favor of Ethel Clare Le Neve, was barred from benefiting from his wife's estate because of the crime. Counsel quoted the precedent of Mrs. Maybrick, who was not permitted to receive any of the insurance on the life of her husband, whom she was accused of killing. The hearing was adjourned for a week.

CHANDLER SAYS "FARCE"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1-Upon learning of the filing of the bill in equity in Boston today, ex-Senator William E. Chandler of New Hampshire, counsel for the Eddy heirs, made the following statement:

"It is only a trick of the so-called religion of Christian Science to get a premature decision in Massachusetts of a very large question which belongs to the State of New Hampshire to decide, namely, whether \$2,000,000 worth of property can pass to a religious society forbidden to take more than \$40,000 or \$100,000. Neither General Baker, the executor, nor the courts of Massachusetts will hasten to assist this device. Mr. McLellan filing a bill against Mr. McLellan and Mr. McLellan admitting to Mr. McLellan that the plaintiff has a good case, is a mere farce."

By securing an adjudication of the legal status of the board of directors of Christian Science under the present friendly action, those interested in the Christian Science cause hope to eliminate a contest of the will, or at least to put a limitation on the hearing that would necessarily ensue, and furthermore to bring all legal entanglements before the courts of this State for settlement. The bill in equity is entered by Stephen A. Chase of Fall River, Archibald McLellan and Archibald McLellan, both of Brookline, and Joseph E. Fernald of Concord, N. H., as trustees under the two deeds of trust executed by Mrs. Eddy and Henry M. Baker of Boston, N. H., as executor of Mrs. Eddy's will.

SAYS TRUST MEN DARED ROOSEVELT (Continued from page 1.) to the bar of justice." Mr. Stanley declared that the "steel trust," in fear of competition from Andrew Carnegie, paid him the colossal sum of \$520,000,000 for a plant rated two years before at \$76,000,000. He cited the absorption of the Tennessee Coal & Iron Company as an evidence of the strength of the "trust," and declared that B. H. Gary and Henry C. Frick went to President Roosevelt and told him that if he dared interfere with their plans, whether legal or illegal, the so-called prosperity of his administration would end in a financial catastrophe. "Never," continued Mr. Stanley, "since the Prince of Darkness appeared to the Nazarene on the mountain, was such a visitation of evil and far reaching dominion unveiled to the vision of God or man. And the hero of San Juan hill and the Saviour of men assumed the same relative position toward the Arch tempter. The Saviour said, 'Get thee behind Me, Satan,' and Roosevelt cried, 'I will get in front of you, thou omnipotent devil, I will paralyze the arm of justice and still the voice of popular clamor while you sandbag a competitor and loot a dominion in the South, rich and vast as an empire.' "If this government," said Mr. Stanley, "is serious and in earnest in its determination to enforce the Sherman anti-trust law, it is in honor bound to call this greatest of all combines, and most allpervading of all trusts, to justice."
