There was a large attendance at the meeting of the Cheese Board yesterday. The following factories boarded cheese in quantities given: Laksville 100, Orwell 75, Union 132, Haselbrook 100, Hillsboro 84, New Glasgow 210, Rad Point 65, Emerald 185, Gowan Brae 60, Red House 74, New Perth 100, Kensington 400, Stanley Bridge 245, Cornwall 115, Dundas 101, S. Peter's 83. The cable received by the Board in the morning read "Montreal strong 12 3/8, to 12, Brookville 12 3/4". The bidding started at 11 3/4 and went up to 12, above which figure the buyers present were reluctant to go. The sellers thought in view of the prices quoted in the cable a higher figure should be obtained. Mr. Dillon then offered twelve and a sixteenth at which price he procured Lakerville, Hillsboro, Red House and St. Peter's. The other factories held their stock. Yesterday's price was excellent last October when cheese listed by the Board was sold for twelve and five eighths.
