

FAST LINE PROJECT.

SIR ROBERT BOND AND THE PROBABLE EFFECTS OF HIS TREATY.

With the United States—Doubt of the Powers he Claims—Imperial Interests as Well as Canadian at Stake—Very Unfavorable Opinion of the Newfoundland Premier.

"Premier Bond is a dangerous man for Canada, for Newfoundland and for the British Empire." The head of the government in the Ancient Colony was thus described by a man who knows him well, who understands his methods and the motives which actuate him.

"I do not believe he has the interest of Newfoundland nor of the Empire at heart. He is for Sir Edward Bond, first, last and all the time. I doubt very much if, as he has apparently announced, he has secured the sanction to the Bond-Blaine agreement by the British Government but if he has, Canada should see that the sanction is withdrawn.

"Last winter when he was in Canada, I spent several hours in his company and during the whole time we discussed the relations of Canada and Newfoundland. He made it clear to me then that his feelings toward the United States were far more friendly than toward Canada and that he does not care two straws for the interests of Empire.

"A man of this sort is an awkward character to have at the head of affairs in any of the British colonies and particularly at this time. It is well understood that the policy of the United States is one of hostility toward Canada. For many years the law makers of the United States have endeavored to make existence in the northern portion of this continent so uncomfortable that Canada would be forced into annexation and not on our terms but on those of the United States.

"There was a good deal of discontent when the British Government, last year consented to the abrogation of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, and gave the United States rights in Central America without affording Canada an opportunity to demand of the United States an agreement for the arbitration of the Alaska boundary question. It was stated then that the British Government should hereafter consider the Dominion of Canada in an adjustment of affairs on this continent.

The proposed Bond-Blaine treaty is a far more serious affair for the Dominion than was the Clayton-Bulwer abrogation. Canada and Newfoundland now have the control of the richest fisheries of the Atlantic or, in fact, of the world. The United States want to obtain unhampered access to them. It is this that Premier Bond tried to convey to them, several years ago, by the famous treaty which bears his name, in return for trading

privileges with the United States. Sir John A. Macdonald opposed the treaty on behalf of Canada and the Imperial sanction was refused. It was refused, not on the mere ground that it was detrimental to Canadian interests but because it was detrimental to British interests in North America.

Undeterred by his first failure Sir Edward Bond has since steadily endeavored to trade the fisheries of the Atlantic for the trading privileges of the United States. He has made use of the Boer war and the French shore situation for this end and now announces that he has succeeded. For the permission to enter Newfoundland fish in the United States free of duty he proposes to give the American fishermen permission to buy bait of the Newfoundland coast without taking out a license and to give the American manufacturer advantage in the Newfoundland market.

"If this arrangement were made the fishermen of the United States would be absolutely uncontrolled by any one. At the present time the American fishing schooner has to take out a license for the purchase of the bait which has to be obtained of the shore of eastern Canada or of Newfoundland, because it cannot be carried in a fresh state from Gloucester or the American ports.

"The license is only a nominal one but to enable the authorities to keep track of the fishing boats and exercises a wholesome restraint upon any inclination their captains may have to over step the fishing regulations.

"A man for instance, who adds smuggling to his regular fishing business runs the risk of being banished from the fisheries by the authorities refusing him a license. Then this bait licensing can be used as an offset for the duty the United States Government imposes upon fish. One of them was punished last week. If the bait were free, and the Americans uncontrolled, Newfoundland's permission to enter fish free of duty would count for little, as the Americans would soon have a monopoly of both the waters and the markets.

"The fisheries are more valuable to Canada than even to the people of Newfoundland, but Sir Frederic Bond is perfectly willing to sacrifice the interests of six million British people for what he believes to be the interests of two hundred thousand British people.

"The fisheries are one of the most valuable assets of the Dominion and should not be parted with, at least not without a struggle on the part of Canada.

"The purpose of the United States in this matter is more than appears on the surface. The Washington negotiators not only desire the material benefits which would result from permission to fish freely, but they desire the sentimental advantage which would result from the creation of a divided interest among the British authorities of North America.

"The only reason Canada has for desiring the annexation of Newfoundland or union with Newfoundland is to so preserve the integrity of British authority on this continent as to resist the encroachment of the Americans.

Mr. Justin McCarthy, the eminent Irish historian, has been heard to vote for the period of Dr. Johnson and Mrs. Theale. Years ago, when Mr. Gladstone was alive, the Grand Old Man and a group of friends were discussing this same question at Hawarden Castle. Mr. Gladstone, without any hesitation, decided from the intellectual point of view, and expressed the opinion that he would describe as the greatest day in the world's history a day in ancient Greece, when Athens was at the summit of its glory.

FELL BACK AND DIED.

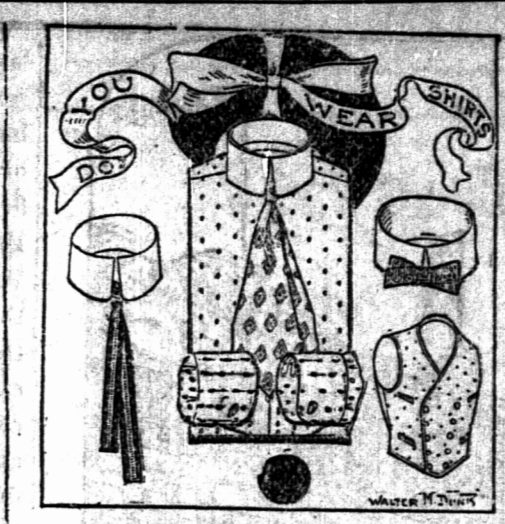
