Australia Seeks Defence Alliance For Pacific Area

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 2 (CP)—Military leaders in this part of the Pacific are busy counting their resources as the communist threat to Hong Kong grows.

Nothing was announced after the secret defence talks between British, Australian and New Zealand service chiefs in Melbourne recently but it is believed they reaffirmed the principle that Australia should be the "main support area" for the Pacific. This means that Australia's main job would be to supply munitions and warlike stores and provide naval and air bases.

Another task assigned to Australia is the carrying out of secret weapons tests, probably including some form of atomic weapons and obviously long-range rocket bombs. Critics say that at present Australia cannot supply most of the munitions needed in the Pacific. There is not nearly enough coal to keep normal peacetime production up to standard. Ambitious government plans for a giant hydro-electric scheme in the Snowy Alps are only paper plans so far and cannot be realized for many years. Diversion of coal or manpower to making munitions on a big scale would mean further housing and steel shortages. The government has not chosen that unpopular course.

The government is silent about the rocket range, but it is known that it is a long way behind schedule. It is not getting priority in materials. The main difficulty, as English science chief Sir Henry Tizard said on an inspection last year, is the shortage of senior and junior scientists.

Even if Australia were to be only a supply base in a war, she would still have to defend her own 3,000 square miles. The picture of her defence is a sorry one compared with that of four years ago.

Her navy is her strongest service, but its total strength is only about 10,000 officers and men compared with a peacetime establishment of nearly 15,000. To man the new fleet aircraft carrier Sydney, sister ship of the Royal Canadian Navy's Magificent, Australia has had to buy off a cruiser. And though the Sydney would be useful in minor war, naval experts say she would be relegated to escort carrier work against a major navy.

More important in a Pacific naval war would be Australia's advanced naval base of Manus, north of New Guinea. This was a huge United States navy base during the war and the U.S. wanted to keep it going. External Affairs Minister Ewart tried to use this as a bargaining point in a Pacific defence pact with the U.S. until finally the Americans quit. Since then the jungle has taken charge and the base is scarcely even a shadow of its usefulness.

Final for Australia's defence is a powerful air force and aircraft industry. Present operating strength is only about seven squadrons, with a total manpower of about 3,500. Targets for the government's post-war defence plan was an air force of more than 13,000 men. There is probably no shortage of pilots at the moment but there is not nearly enough ground staff.
