Address And Presentation to Rev. Mr. Smith, York

On Monday evening, June 20th, York congregation assembled at the home of Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Smith, who leave next week for the Dauphin District, Manitoba, thereby fulfilling a long premeditated desire in that direction by responding to the call of the West for young vital manhood. Christ, and Mr. Smith, although a comparatively young man, is an earnest worker and has already made for himself a name as a forceful, eloquent preacher of the Gospel of salvation through Christ, and we feel confident that he will if spared to the Master's service, lay a corner stone broad, solid and eternal in the foundation of the great Church of God in Western Canada.

While in P. E. Island, Mr. and Mrs. Smith have attached to themselves many friends whose kind wishes and prayers follow them to their new field of labor, and while we regret the loss to our Eastern pulpits of men of force such as Mr. Smith, we know that God, not man, alone calls His servants to their allotted fields and bow in submission to that call.

Only One Woman Hanged in Canada In Last 25 Years

CLEMENCY LIKELY TO BE ASKED FOR MRS. GALLOP.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 22.—The death sentence imposed on Saturday on Mrs. Emily Gallop recalls the fact that only one woman has actually paid the supreme penalty of the law in Canada in the last 25 years. This was Florence Lassandra, who was executed in May 1923, for the murder of Constable Steve Lawson near Coleman, Alberta, in connection with a bootlegging arrest. Amillo Picariello, styled "King of the bootleggers" on the inter-provincial and international borders in the Crow's Nest country, was hanged on the same scaffold as Mrs. Lassandra for the same murder.

Madam Gagnon, sentenced in the Quebec court of five years ago to be hanged for the murder of her step-child, escaped the scaffold. She gave birth to twins in the death cell and medical men testified that these probably would not survive without the mother's care. Her sentence therefore was commuted. The execution of Mrs. Gallop is fixed for October 15 next. Before that time there will be a review of the circumstances in the case by the Department of Justice which will eventually recommend to the Governor in Council whether or not there should be any clemency in the case.
