U. S. Gets Much Snow

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The most widespread snow of the winter slowed traffic in many sections of the United States today. The fall, ranging from light traces to two feet in depth, whitened the landscape in at least 33 States.

Weather observers reported that the snow cover was "the most extensive in recent years." Only the extreme south and the Pacific Coast, they added, escaped the snowstorms which have swept across the country since Friday.

The heaviest burden was 24 inches in Clinton, Mo. Fort Smith, Ark., had an 18-inch deposit. The snow measured 16 inches on the eastern shore of Maryland, and in Rome, N. Y.

Cold weather remained in many sections. The official minimum in the United States was the 20-below-zero in Burwell, Neb.

Seventeen days of almost continuous freezing weather coated the entrances of several New England harbors with ice. Coast guard boats opened channels for small craft.

Free Postal Privileges For Front Line Troops

Canadian soldiers when serving in a theatre of actual war will be able to send their correspondence free of postage, the Honourable Charles G. Power, Canada's Postmaster General, announced today.

This privilege is likewise extended to members of British, Dominion, Colonial and Allied Forces also serving in a theatre of actual war and to officers and men serving in His Majesty's Warships or Allied Warships afloat.

Such correspondence received in Canada will, on arrival at destination, be delivered without the collection of postage charges.

Soldiers who are not in a theatre of actual warfare and who have full mailing facilities at their disposal do not come within this arrangement for the present at least, and British postage is required on correspondence from members of the Forces in Great Britain addressed to Canada.

As the result of arrangements made with Great Britain, the Postmaster General has authorized special rates on parcels mailed in Canada addressed to Canadian troops serving in Great Britain and France.

Commencing January 1st, parcels addressed to troops overseas will be accepted at a rate of 12 cents a pound, with a weight limit of 11 pounds. This is an approximate reduction from ordinary parcel post rates.

To expedite the despatch of mails to the troops, a Base Post Office has been established for the centralized control and handling of mail for Canada's overseas military forces. This Base Post Office is manned by experienced Post Office personnel regularly enlisted in the Canadian Active Forces. The Base Post Office is the Home Depot and Training Centre for the entire personnel of the overseas units of the Canadian Postal Corps.

At this Base Post Office mails are separated according to formations going forward in bags labelled to respective units. On arrival overseas this mail will be handled by members of the Divisional Unit of the Canadian Postal Corps which also comprises experienced officials trained in the Canadian Postal Service.

The volume of mail handled is steadily increasing. Already one-half ton of mail passes daily through the Base Post Office for the officers and men overseas.

Although the Post Office Department is doing its utmost to facilitate the despatch of mails to and from troops of the Canadian Active Forces serving overseas, there is still room for improved co-operation on the part of the mailing public.

This is particularly the case in regard to the packing and addressing of parcels. A number of parcels and letters already sent will not reach their destination intact owing to loose and careless packing and faulty addressing.

The need for proper packing cannot be too strongly emphasized. Flimsy cardboard boxes and thin tissue paper are entirely inadequate. Strong containers and thick wrapping paper are essential. The parcel should be firmly wrapped and well bound with strong cord or other equally suitable binding material.

Considerable time has been devoted by the staff of the Base Post Office, endeavoring to repair and repack improperly prepared parcels.

A broom wielded by an Army Postal Corps member was required "mop up" the debris of a faultily packed fruit cake. In another instance a search was made through the mail to find a handful of marbles broken through the packing of a game of "Chinese Checkers." The goods in another parcel were damaged by the contents of a broken container. These contents are great not only through the original parcel but also damaged the contents of other parcels.

In conclusion, it is desired to again accentuate the necessity of all mail being legibly and completely addressed. Many items are at present being held in the Base Post Office because of incomplete addressing. Abbreviations cause unnecessary delay and should be avoided.

Be sure that all your overseas letters and parcels are addressed as follows:—

Regimental No.
Rank and Name.
Full name of Regiment or Unit
C. A. S. F.
c/o Base Post Office, Canada,
and also place your return address in the upper left hand corner.

If these simple instructions are followed your mail will reach the troops with a minimum of delay.

Contraband Control Is Far Reaching

ROME, Jan. 8.—(AP)—How thoroughly the British contraband control pursues its game is shown in this story reaching Rome from Gibraltar, one of the Mediterranean control points.

The captain of an Italian ship, unsympathetic toward the British officer who came aboard, said no one on the liner spoke English. The inspector held the ship six hours while he sent ashore for an interpreter.

Through the interpreter, the inspector asked the captain if he had 1,250 sacks of mail from the United States.

"Yes," replied the captain.

"We would like to have sack 350," the inspector said. "It contains a registered package of diamonds consigned to Germany."

Sack 350 yielded the package of diamonds—which was confiscated as contraband.
