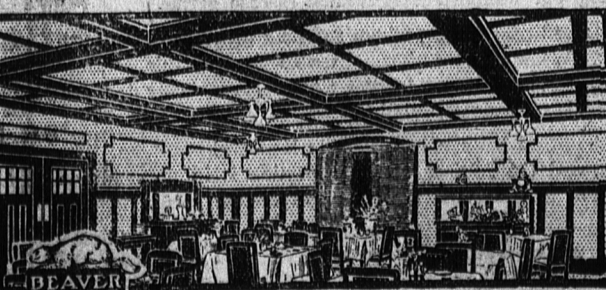

FOX NOTES.—At the annual meeting of the Ellis Silver and Black Beauty Fox Co., Ltd. whose ranch is at Alberton, P. E. I., held in Boston, Mass., on Saturday, April 1st, 1916, the directors declared a cash dividend of 20 per cent on the shares of the capital stock of the Company, and reserved sufficient funds available to protect all expenses for another year. The affairs of the Company were found to be in splendid financial condition. The entire increase of foxes for 1915, were only at an exceptionally high figure under the existing war conditions, and the shareholders were fortunate in receiving this large dividend. The animals in the Company's ranch are reported to be in a splendid condition. The Company has never lost a fox by accident or otherwise and they have never had any sickness in their ranch. The company's foxes are now heavy with young and good litters are expected in the course of a few days. Wounded in Battle Returns to P. E. I.

Yesterday citizens had the pleasure of welcoming home another wounded Island soldier, Alexander McDougall son of Mrs. Samuel McDougall of West River. The returned hero was met by a detachment from "A" Company under command of Major McNutt, the full strength headed by the Band having been down in the morning, but owing to the absence of Private McDougall being late, they had to return to their barracks. Mr. McDougall was a member of "A" Company of the 26th Battalion, and took part in the famous "Battle of the Crater" around Ypres on October the 13th. He was quite close to Private John McLean of this city who was killed in this action. Private McLean was a member of the same company, and there were about 14 other Islanders altogether in that battle. He says that Mr. McLean had received a bullet wound in the head, and lingered a little time after the shooting. He saw him at the dressing station afterwards. McDougall himself was wounded in the foot by an explosive bullet on the same day. He was taken to the Hospital at Sandling England and left there on April the 4th for Canada. He was there and suggest that the 13 Canadians coming out on the "Scandinavian." His battalion went under fire early in September, and was in action about three weeks before he received his wound. At Sandling he met a number of Island boys including Private McLean and Private McFarlane of Charlottetown.

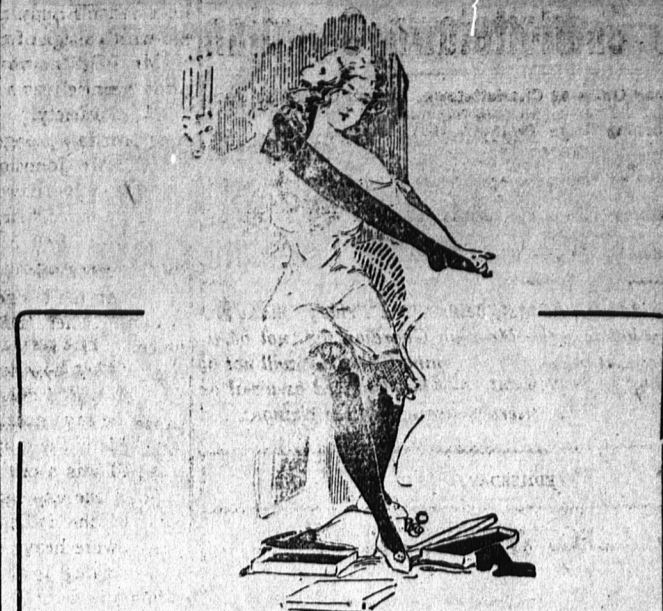

Additional funds to make up the existing deficit and to defray the full cost of the building of the annex to the main building and other improvements. Mr. William Stewart, Chairman of the Trustees presided and in calling the meeting to order explained that when the annex was built, the Ladies Aid had offered to contribute \$1800 towards the cost. They had however exceeded that amount and had contributed \$2312. As the ladies had done so well he thought the men should now rise to the occasion and free the institution from debt. The amount required was \$3,000, \$1500 of which should be raised in the town without any trouble. He would go further and suggest that the amount aimed at should be \$3500, in order that all existing liabilities should be cleared up and a snug balance left for contingencies. Considering the length of time the institution had been in existence and the amount of good it has accomplished the present financial position was very gratifying. The matter was discussed by a number of those present after which the meeting was adjourned till Monday next at 8 p. m. to which the public are cordially invited.
