Address To Rev. R. F. Macdonald

The following complimentary address was given Rev. R. F. Macdonald, Indian River, on the occasion of his 25th Anniversary of his Ordination, January 14th, 1948.

Rev. Dear Father: - As the twenty-fifth Anniversary of your Ordination to the Holy Priesthood approached, it became apparent that the consensus of the congregation of St. Mary's, Indian River, was that some fitting recognition should be given-notwithstanding your self-sacrificing adoration and admonition to the contrary.

Twenty-five years of zealous and industrious labor in the shepherding of souls deserves more than passing interest and mere lip service.

It is now eighteen years since you were appointed to the pastorate of Indian River. You were then youthful and energetic just beyond the adolescent stage of life. We are glad to note that your perennial energy and many souls have even increase paradoxically in your ratio of years, and it is the ardent wish of your congregation that it will be ever thus with you till the Great Shepherd calls you to your eternal reward.

The spiritual life of the parish has always been your first consideration, and many souls have enjoyed spiritual consolation through your ministrations.

Your intense energy and keen sense of the fitness of things soon found expression in the remodeling, grading, landscaping and beautifying of the church, parochial buildings and grounds. The transformation in surface content of the cemetery was in itself a revelation.

The result of this inspiration and parish collaboration is that St. Mary's, Indian River, is at present judged by connoisseurs in scenic and architectural beauty to be one of the best in this province.

The church of the Holy Family, Kensington, built in 1937, is a fitting monument to your inspiration and initiative.

We know that you would not claim sole credit for the work accomplished, but we must give you credit for the planning and motivating the God given gift of inspiring and energizing; hence, the almost absolute co-operation of every parishoner, which made the beautification program possible.

During your absence of nearly six years ministering to the spiritual needs of Canadian soldiers in the Second World War the parish was administered by Rev. Father Joseph N. Trainor, who also endeared himself to this congregation. We are glad to know that he is situated in a congenial atmosphere in Brace Parish.

Although you were quite distant and in the vortex of the distant human conflict this world has ever seen, your abiding interest in the diminished-as evidenced by a continuous correspondence.

Now dear Father, since we have enumerated briefly some of the tributes of heart and mind which have endeared you to us, we think you will understand our desire to rejoice with you on this happy occasion. With this small gift we offer our hearty congratulations and the sincere wish that you may be spared for many years to labor in the vineyard.

(Signed on behalf of all parishoners.) The address was read by James Pendegast, and the presentation was made by Wilfred Gillis.

Father Macdonald was utterly surprised and pleased. He replied in a reminiscent and formal manner and expressed his thanks most graciously.-K.
