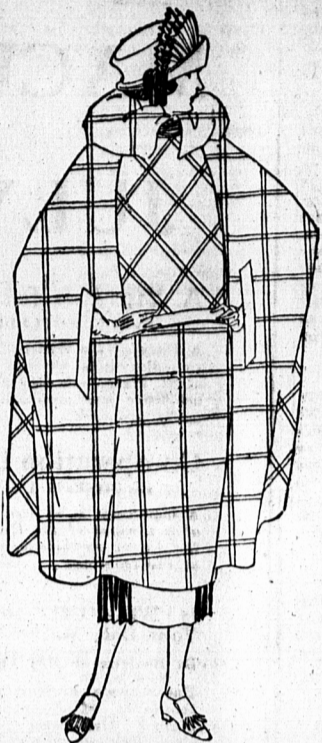

Across the border they seem to be more unfortunate in this matter than we are. "My Country 'Tis of Thee" is objected to by many over there because the air is the same as that of "God Save the King" and therefore not acceptable to Republican ears. "The Star Spangled Banner" has an air of such extreme range that few persons can sing it easily, and, as an exchange puts the case, "it is damned from a literary point of view by the first two words, 'O Say.' " Yankee Doodle has a quick and stirring movement and vies in popularity with "Dixie Land," but neither of the two seems well fitted for a National Anthem.

Almost every English-speaking schoolboy in Canada is familiar with the "Maple Leaf," but in Quebec, and among our French speaking people generally, "O Canada" is preferred alike for its better literary and musical composition. The preponderance of numbers who sing the "Maple Leaf" seems likely to continue. The maple tree is native to every province of Canada; it has a richer life-blood than its fellows in our abundant forests, and as has been poetically expressed: "it sheds sweetness upon the axe that fells it." The words are, however, evidently borrowed from the Persian proverb: "Be careful to cultivate a forgiving spirit, like the Sandal Tree which sheds fragrance upon the axe that cuts it down." Thus a sentiment almost divine surrounds

and clings to the Sandal Tree of the Orient and our own Canadian maple.

GERMAN GIRLS GET WORK AT GOOD PAY IN HOLLAND

BERLIN, July 14.—Holland's frontier, made notorious during the war as a favorite exit from Germany for fugitive prisoners of war, is again coming into the limelight through the surreptitious crossing of young German girls, anxious to get Dutch employment. It is estimated that Germany is already poorer by 20,000 female servants as a result of this practice. With high wages and attractive working conditions, Holland has become something of a "promised land" for German frauens qualified as housemaids or cooks. Twenty to twenty-five guilders a month are paid beginners, while the more efficient receive from 40 to 50. Such pay means from 2,000 to 5,000 marks monthly at the present rate of exchange, about ten times more than help of this kind receives in Germany.
