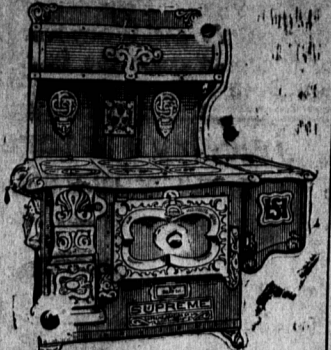

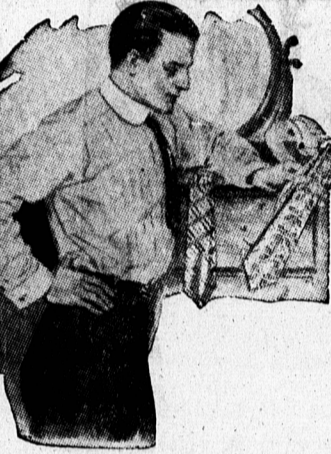

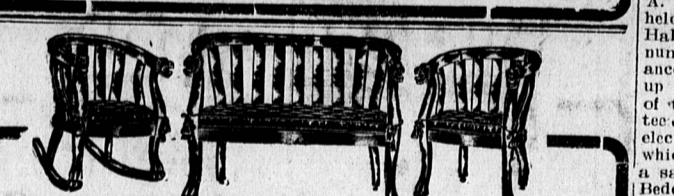

—Considerable uneasiness is felt concerning Alberton, N. B., the home of James Roach, Darnley, says the Pioneer, who is supposed to have left Bangor, Me., for home about the last of March and of whom nothing has been heard since. Mr. Roach had worked in the Maine woods during the winter and was seen in Bangor during the last week in March, presumably on his way home. It is known that he carried on his person his winter's earnings, about \$150. It was at first supposed that he had gone to visit one or both of his sisters, one of whom lives twenty miles out of Bangor and the other in Boston, but neither the sisters nor his parents have heard anything of him since he mysteriously disappeared in Bangor, Me., for home about the last years of age, and was always cheerful and industrious. When away from home he wrote regularly to his parents and this adds to their belief that he has met with foul play. He owned a farm in Darnley, recently purchased and his winter's earnings were intended to complete the payment. It is understood that his parents are in communication with the Bangor chief of police in the hope of finding some clue to his whereabouts or to his fate.
