WORLD CHANGES.

In Chicago, last month, before the Federal Council of the American Churches Dr. J. A. McDonald, editor of The Globe, Toronto, gave a remarkable address. His text was the changing world and the way in which the churches must strike a new note in the world politics of this changing day, for upon that depends the future of the world.

Referring to the much quoted changing in China and the East, the changing America and the changing West, what is happening, he said, is a changing world. Not New York alone, or Chicago, or San Francisco, or Vancouver, or Winnipeg is the melting pot. In no one place and on no one continent is the clash of ideals and the conflict of civilization. The line of battle is far flung. Everywhere it is hand to hand, foot to foot, blade to blade. The nations are crowding together into one crucible of international conflict as by the irresistible compulsion of some eternal destiny.

In the light of this conflict, the map of the world is being repainted. Every day's newspapers tell of political ferment, industrial disturbance and social upheaval, the passing of ancient dynasties, the overthrow of venerable institutions, revolutions and readjustments that are shifting the centres of world power. And in the midst of it all distance is being annihilated, walls of separation are breaking down and all the nations are being crowded together in one world community. "Rubbing shoulders in one world street, exchanging courtesies or curses face to face."

Dr. McDonald's question is "How are the nations, alien in their instincts, diverse in their history, antagonistic in their purposes to learn to live together in one world community?" Diplomacy, with its deceit and its checkmating, he says, is not sufficient. Armies and navies

will not avail. The nations cannot live together in peace until they are of one mind. "A world community armed to the teeth means hell."

In view of the crisis in the world situation what is the duty of the churches? "As a Canadian," said Dr. McDonald, "I make appeal to this great Federal Council of American Christianity. Is not the time come for the redemption of diplomacy from studied deceit? Are not the conditions ready for the Christianization of the relations of Christian nations? Is it not a monstrous denial of the policy and purpose of Jesus that the greatest nations bearing the Christian name are the most heavily burdened with war debts and war budgets? Is it not pathetic to the point of apostasy that the three great Christian countries are foremost in the mad race for armament?"

Who is to show the world this most excellent way? Surely America. Here it was that the oppressed of Europe and Asia found their new hope. This new nation should lead the new way. And not these United States alone but Canada as well. In America's power for the peace of the world Canada must also count for one. "In matters of defence on the Atlantic and on the Pacific the power of America today is the power of the United States and the power of Canada, plus the power of Britain."

"I put it to you," said Dr. McDonald, "you, American churches, who owe to Germany and to Britain your deepest faith, is it not time you join hands with your brethren to lift this insufferable mountain of international suspicion and fear forever out of the way? The churches of America, Britain and Germany can create a Triple Alliance of Christian peace against which the powers of darkness cannot prevail."

TIME'S UP.

In an interview with Hon. D. Nicholson, on his return from Ottawa for the Christmas holidays, the statement was made, on the authority of the Marine Department, that the contract for the Prince Edward Island car ferry would positively be let not later than the middle of January.

tract for the Prince Edward Island car ferry would positively be let not later than the middle of January.

The time is up, and aside from a statement credited by a St. John newspaper to the Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine, during a discussion in the House of Commons on Monday, the 20th inst., and reported in The Morning Guardian of the 23rd, no word has as yet been received of the awarding of the contract. There is no official confirmation that the Minister made the statement, as the Hazard reports for that date have not yet been received. Neither is there any announcement from the Prince Edward Island representatives to throw any light on the Minister's assurance that the contract had been let.

We have no doubt that the Department's assurance to Hon. Mr. Nicholson was given; we have no reason to doubt that the Minister of Marine was correctly reported by the St. John Standard when, as previously stated, he said in reply to Hon. H. R. Emerson, that the contract had been let. But, in the absence of all doubt, there is an uncomfortable mystery. The awarding of such a contract as this, a contract to which the eyes of Prince Edward Islanders have been turned for months, a contract which certain critics have been casting some doubt upon, should be of sufficient importance to at least justify the Prince Edward Island representatives, or even the Minister, or the Deputy or somebody sending a message to the expectant friends at home announcing the event. "But the message that we looked for never came."

Why did the Minister say the contract was awarded? If he did not say so, why was it not awarded, as the Department promised Mr. Nicholson, by the middle of January? And there are other whys. It is certainly time that the people had some definite assurance concerning this matter. These assurances to critical opposition members on the floor of the House have a suspicious ring about them which sets the people asking questions and wondering why the information, if information it is, had not come in the regular way.

THE GIRL KNOWS HOW TO GROW TURKEYS. It is now up to the Prince Edward Island members either to confirm the assertion of the Honorable the Minister of Marine or to demand a fulfilment of the promise that the contract would be awarded not later than the present date—after the middle of January.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., Jan. 21.—Miss Laura Gilpin, the daughter of Francis and Mrs. Gilpin, has studied turkeys from A to Z and knows their habits and traits of character from the time the egg is pipped until the big bird lies on its back and sticks its brown legs into the air in the centre of the dinner table. And she has turned her knowledge to such good account that she is the envy of all the belles of the Pike's Peak region.

Starting out last summer to raise turkeys on her father's ranch at Austin, Col., for "pin money," Miss Gilpin soon realized that she had an idea that could be turned into dollars instead of cents. So, being the daughter of a mining stock broker and promoter, and having the natural instinct, she decided to plunge—decided to "make or break" right on the jump. She made.

Scouring the country for miles around the ranch, Miss Gilpin "collected" all the young turkeys she could buy—more than four hundred in number—and then subscribed for all the poultry journals in the country that she thought would shed any light on the science of making big birds out of little ones.

Tenderly nursing her flock of pets through the heat of July, August and September, Miss Gilpin brought more than ninety per cent. of them past the danger point.

Miss Gilpin is now in Colorado Springs buying new clothes and making arrangements to pass the winter in New York city and Boston on the profits made from her enterprise—profits that run well up into four figures.

Where Miss Gilpin had four hundred turkeys this year, she intends to raise two or three times as many next year, and feels sure that they will bring top-notch prices.

A PUBLIC SANATORIUM

AMHERST, Jan. 20.—At the last session of the municipal council the matter of a sanatorium for the city was taken up with enthusiasm, and many of the members subscribed to assist along the project. A committee was appointed to look into the matter and their report was submitted to the council last week. While the final settlement of the matter was delayed till the spring session, Miss Gilpin has been busy before the end of the year. An offer was made by Wentworth with a subscription list of \$175.50 to cover the expense of grading a road to the sanatorium. Westchester's offer was a free grant of land of twenty acres and a public road to the same, or, if the committee preferred, \$300 in cash.

MAY REVOLUTIONIZE LIGHTING

PARIS, Jan. 21.—M. Dussaud, the French discoverer of "cold light," gives some details of his process which, it is thought, may revolutionize electric lighting. Starting on the principle that rest is as essential to matter as to animals, he has constructed an electric lamp, in which the light is concentrated on a single point by filaments working successfully; then the light is projected through a lens magnifying a thousand fold. Thus he has succeeded in concentrating a 2,000-candle power on one point and in passing thirty-two volts into an eight-volt lamp, which with ordinary light would burst.

Mrs. Schenck was arrested November 9th, 1910, on a charge of attempting to poison her husband by administering arsenic. After a sensational trial the jury disagreed and the woman was released on \$10,000 bond.

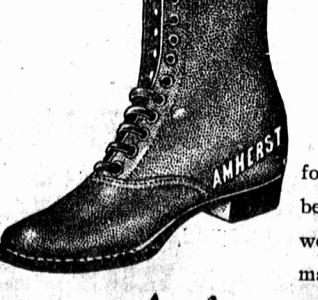
