the end of last week show that cutting had commenced in the neighborhood of 75 per cent. of the localities and that by to-day it would be general over all the wheat growing lands.

The despatch adds that the weather is everything the farmers could desire, and by the middle of September the transportation of this season's crop will be in full swing.

The Canadian Pacific Company are busy concentrating their rolling stock and locomotives, so that when the movement of the traffic is started it will proceed with the greatest expedition, in order that the farmers may be able to benefit by the first flush of the markets.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 26.—After the arrival of to-day's trains it is expected that not less than 11,000 harvesters will have been distributed. This year the cry for extra female help has been responded to, and it has been estimated that from 1,500 to 2,000 women will come from the East by this year's harvesters' excursions. Many of these are going to assist friends in the farming communities and few are open for engagement when they reach Winnipeg.

The weather still continues bright and warm, and wheat cutting all over Manitoba and the Territories is going on apace. If nothing should occur it is hoped that by the end of the first week of September cutting will be about over. As it is, a great deal of wheat is now ready for threshing. Where men are available the farmers are stacking their grain as rapidly as possible, but the prospects are that there will be more stock threshing this fall than usual. The straw is so long and so heavy on the ground that stacking is a very slow process.
