NEW YORK Aug 24.—Proof of the paleontologist's pet theory that Asia was the "mother of continents" and the cradle of life on this globe—carrying with it great promise of the discovery in the wastes of the Gobi desert of the long-sought "missing link" in the evolution of mankind—has been found by the Third Asiatic Expedition led by Roy Chapman Andrews for the American Museum of Natural History, Henry Fairfield Osborn, the Museum's director, announced today.

Thieves Remove Wine From Homes In Ottawa

OTTAWA, Aug. 24.—During the past week there has been an epidemic of burglaries in the Sandy Hill district of Ottawa. Some of these cases have been reported to the police, but all the efforts so far made by the force have failed to bring in the thief or thieves. Indeed, they have been operating right under the noses of the police, for only the day before yesterday a Sandy Hill house was entered through the cellar window between 9 o'clock in the morning and 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and several cases of whiskey and wines stolen.

FRENCH ART GIFTS TO GO TO MONTREAL
