Red Army hands Out hospitality Despite blizzard By EDDY GILMORE Associated Press Staff Writer WITH THE RED ARMY SOMEWHERE IN RUSSIA - March 15 - (Delayed) - (AP) - The Red Army finds a way to hand out hospitality even from a hole in the ground. "Come into our quarters," said senior Lieut. Anatoly Bayarino above the screen of a blizzard, and see how we live out here." The party followed him downward into a hole. He led the way through a narrow boarded tunnel under tons of snow. "We entered a small pine-boarded room to shake off the snow and then were led down a dormitory flanked on either side by neat beds. The room was warm and clean. Soldiers were playing pool and checkers, and in one corner a radio played music. "The soldiers have made everything in their spare time, said the lieutenant. "The regimental commander marched in as the soldiers spread a table with fish, bread and vodka to welcome us. "This morning," the commander said slowly in English, smiling broadly, "I once worked in an English factory. I speak some English." Toasts followed - first to Premier Joseph Stalin, Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt. The Russians toast with vodka. It is bad form not to toss the whole drink off at once; themselves out to be entertaining. Two muscular privates, garbed in sailor suits which they had made themselves, danced a big rumber danced in a homemade gypsy costume, and then eight singers joined in the rousing chorus of a Red army song. Soldiers who were not busy with duties came down for the performance, and when it was over departed in a howling gale. "A party ended in a hearty round of goodbyes. As we walked slowly away to the last rays of daylight, the Russian soldier with a farewell look but the shelter was so well camouflaged that it seemed to have disappeared.

Observers in Mandalay believe that if the decision is not won by mid-May, the war in Burma will be literally washed up for five months with the invaders and defenders immobilized. If Japan is intent on advancing up the coast to India during the next two months rather than throwing her full strength against the British-Chinese front, then the Japanese risk flank will be exposed indefinitely.

The Stokers had scored five in the first period and two in the second before they really cut loose.
