### Changes in Insurance Ratings

The Canadian Underwriters' Association has announced today changes in Automobile Insurance rating practices to become effective on January 1, 1947. The rating programmes contain practically no changes in the rating of trucks except that Fire and Theft on trucks and on Private Passenger automobiles will be rated as one cover. The Fire and Theft rates on trucks will approximate the sum of those formerly applicable to the separate covers. The Fire and Theft rates for Private Passenger automobiles have been materially reduced. A change in the method of rating and rates for the Public Liability, Property Damage and Collision cover is being made in respect of Private Passenger automobiles.

Loss experience obtained during the period of gasoline rationing indicates that these covers can be carried by insurers on Private Passenger Automobiles at lower rates than those used for business. In consequence of this the new method of rating the Public Liability, Property Damage and Collision covers for Private Passenger automobiles provides for two types of rating. The first consists of individuals whose chief use of the automobile is "pleasure" and clergymen and farmers. Pleasure is considered as including the use of the automobile as transportation between the residence and place of business of the insured. The second type consists of automobiles or partnerships, companies, corporations and individuals not coming within the description of the first type.

The rates for Public Liability, Property Damage and Collision insurance for the first type will be approximately 20 per cent less than for the second. While the rates for automobiles used chiefly for business purposes will be slightly higher than those applicable at the commencement of the war, the rates applicable to those used for "pleasure" will be slightly lower. The rating programme also includes a reduction in the charge for increased limits in respect of the Public Liability and Property Damage covers for both Private Passenger automobiles and trucks.

Leading underwriters express the hope that the rates will prove to be adequate but draw attention to the fact that the number of automobile accidents has increased materially since the cessation of gasoline rationing and the increase in the speed limit and urge the public to keep in mind the condition of tires and mechanical equipment and to use the same for it in the manner in which automobiles are driven.

### Romania Is Facing Acute Economic Crisis

BELGRADE, Dec. 9.—(Reuters)—Romania although one of the richest countries in the world, is going through an acute economic crisis. A breakdown in agricultural production and lack of transportation are the main causes of the pending period of hunger and misery.

So complete is the devastation of means of transportation that one economic expert in the country suggests that if the Allies could give 1,000 transport planes—thousands are lying unused on the East European front—they might save the country. Romania has enough gasoline to run the planes and plenty of trained pilots.

Railways damaged by Allied bombings during the war were demolished by the Germans during their retreat and most of the rolling stock was destroyed or taken to Germany. Now Romania is bound by armistice terms to hand over to Russia more tracks and rolling stock than she can produce or repair in a month.

The Germans also took away most of the Danube barges and tug-boats now reported to be lying idle in the large shippingyard at Regensburg in Allied hands.

Road transport, highly developed because of the cheapness of gasoline, has almost disappeared owing to the requisitioning of trucks and cars first by the Germans and later by the Russians.

Economic experts say that if transportation were available and goods could be circulated more freely, high prices and inflation danger would disappear.

Even more important than the lessening of agricultural production due to inefficient organization.

Tractors have been requisitioned and are lying idle. At the same time oxen are being made to Britain to send more tractors.

Drought has left little fodder for the land and most of the cattle must be slaughtered.

Both industrial and agricultural production are affected by the presence of a large army of occupation. Manufacturers are loath to produce goods which may be used for needs of the army and peasants have returned to their wartime habit of hoarding crops.

### Hunter River Boys Welcomed

A very pleasant social gathering was held in the Masonic Hall, Hunter River, on Thursday, November twenty-second, as a token of good-will and welcome to the boys who donned the King's uniform during the recent war.

The hall was tastefully decorated for the occasion. While the guests were assembling, Miss Edith Crowell rendered vocal selections with guitar accompaniment. At seven-thirty p.m. a bountiful chicken supper was served by a special committee of ladies to about forty boys and their parents.

Two toasts were proposed, one to the King by Rev. John I. Morrison, and one to the returned soldiers by Mr. Donald Nicholson. To the latter toast, Mr. Hilton MacMillan, recently home from the overseas theater of war, made a fitting reply.

Following the supper, the hall was filled to capacity with members of the district who were eager to show their appreciation of the returned men in a tangible manner.

The overseas boys were called to the platform and an address of welcome was read by Mr. J. S. MacLeod, president of World War I. This was followed by a presentation by Dr. J. R. Murchison, also a veteran of World War I, of a set of pens and pencil set and copy of the address read, each man being heartily cheered as he received his gift.

Very inspiring addresses were given by Rev. John I. Morrison and Mr. Donald Nicholson, President of the district. Mr. Morrison spoke very feelingly regarding the two members of the district, who made the supreme sacrifice and called for one minute of silent prayer in their memory.

Mr. W. Patterson and Mr. W. G. Darke also spoke. Corporal Gordon Way, on behalf of his comrades, thanked the community members for kindness shown on this occasion.

The program committee then took charge, the opening number being a jolly sing-along in which all joined. Mr. Nicholson favored his hearers with a beautifully rendered recitation of "The Soldier" by J. S. MacLeod. Mr. Robinson, master of ceremonies, conducted a most successful "Share the Wealth" contest.

The opening statement closed with a group-singing contest followed by the National Anthem.

The following is the address made by Mr. J. S. MacLeod:

It is with much pleasure that your friends of this community are gathered here tonight to express their gratitude for your splendid sacrificial service, rendered for the good of your country and mankind.

It is a very precious thing to have the good wishes of your fellow citizens. Together you have stood for the best things in life—the defence of our homes, our families and loved ones. You fought for our liberties, our civil and religious, from being trampled upon by pagan Nazism. You went out to fight for these things, not knowing that you would return, and you did not shrink nor turn back until the great task was accomplished and victory won.

"Where duty called or danger, you were never wanting there." And while we are welcoming you home tonight we cannot but think that two of your number will not come back. Wilfred and Dan. These two boys were two splendid young men. They left their home, at the call of duty, as you did, with high hopes in their hearts. They gave their life for the freedom and peace which we enjoy. They gave their all. Yes, they made the supreme sacrifice. They laid down their life in order that this world would be a better place in which to live. Tonight, sincerely extend to their loved ones our heartfelt sympathy.

"We shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them."

During these years your experiences would be welcome to you, if you were here, and you would help you in the years to come. We feel that you must be a master of peculiar pleasure to you to be assured, as you may be, that the future of our country which you so freely gave to your country now comes back to you in the genuine regard of all who know you.

May we add to this tribute, our small token of esteem and best wishes for your future happiness. Signed on behalf of the Community of Hunter River.

### KENYA GOLD EXPORTS

NAIROBI, Kenya—(CP)—Gold Dullion to the value of about £100,000 (\$1,500,000) was exported from Kenya last year. The gold was available from long-established mines, but the future of the industry depends to a large extent on the discovery of new workable gold deposits.

### 1,500 Enemy Agents Arrested During War

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—(AP)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation disclosed today that more than 1,500 enemy agents were arrested in the western hemisphere during the war.

Searches of alien enemy premises in the United States uncovered 3,177 short-wave radio receivers, 2,240 sticks of dynamite, 4,698 firearms, 306,247 rounds of ammunition and other contraband articles in large quantities, the F. B. I. said in a report rounded up its activities in the four years following Dec. 7, 1941.

During the wartime period 16,092 alien enemies were arrested, the F. B. I. said.

### Warns New Weapons Worse Than A-Bombs

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—(C P)—Major Gen. Brook Chisholm, Deputy Minister of Health and Welfare said in an address that new weapons were working on "new weapons that make the atomic bomb a mere child's toy" and that the human race was doomed to almost complete destruction probably within 36 years unless our way of thinking is changed soon.

Speaking at a service (Kiwania) club luncheon, he said no nation could win a war in the future and "not even humanity will survive." He urged free thinking as a solution, with no impositions placed on children who must be allowed to face the facts. They should not be taught fantasies or asked to believe everything their parents said.

### Ball Team Tour Held Up Awaiting Travel Permits

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Fifteen National League baseball players, inoculated against diseases of the Pacific and with visas in hand, were held up here since Nov. 26 waiting for travel priorities from the army. It was announced today by Lawrence Phillips, executive vice-president of the United Services Organization, that the team is in a "stalemate situation."

Phillips declared, "I had a meeting with the players this morning and suggested that we call the whole thing off, but they voted to wait a while longer. I told them we should wait until Wednesday at the very latest."

"It is a bad situation, unfair alike to these players who answered our request for volunteers for the tour and to the servicemen in the Pacific who were told the big-leaguers were coming," Phillips concluded, heatedly.

Coach Chuck Dressen of Brooklyn Dodgers is manager of the stalled baseballers. Among the better known players on his card are Charles (Red) Barrett and Whitey Kurowski of St. Louis.
