### NEED COOKS IN AUSTRALIA.

The long-cherished theory that the world's surplus feminine population could be married off if it could be persuaded to migrate to the Antipodes is not borne out in a report of the Home Office in Great Britain upon the demand for women in Australia. Women are wanted badly in the great island continent, but not so much for marriage as for domestic servants. So great is the demand, according to the report, that many of the girls coming from England have been engaged by wireless as cooks and servants in Australian households before their steamer reaches port. In some cases, men have been so hard up for cooks that they have gone out in tugs to meet incoming vessels to make sure that they have the first pick of girls seeking employment. The first few days following the landing of the immigrants resemble an old hiring fair. The employers besiege the labor bureau in hundreds, and in a short time every newcomer leaving domestic work is pretty certain to have secured a situation at wages more than double the sum which she could command in England. The commission learned of complaints that the scarcity of servants in Australia involves such a burden on housewives that it was affecting seriously their health, and even acting as a check upon the much-desired increase of the population.

## GERMANY BEGINNING TO FEEL PRESSURE OF BRITISH BLOCKADE

**Walter Runciman Says that the Enemy's Food Supplies are Being Depleted—Declares that Allies Must Take Steps to See that Germany is Unable to Carry on Trade War Against Them After Peace is Signed.**

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Jan. 11.—Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, won tremendous applause from the House of Commons tonight by a speech in which he declared that the economic pressure of our blockade, which food supplies are becoming depleted, while ours are increasing. Although our exports have fallen and our imports, risen there is no doubt that the economic strength of Great Britain is so well founded that we can stand the strain far better than the Central Powers.

Germany of the fruitlessness of continuing the struggle. "We can stand the strain longer than Germany," continued Mr. Runciman, "and if we husband our resources the disaster that will fall upon her will be almost irrevocable. We must make it clear, however, that when peace comes we will not permit the outbreak of the economic war which Germany would wage against ourselves and our Allies."

"There are signs," he said, "that at last Germany is beginning to feel the economic pressure of our blockade. Her food supplies are becoming depleted, while ours are increasing. Although our exports have fallen and our imports, risen there is no doubt that the economic strength of Great Britain is so well founded that we can stand the strain far better than the Central Powers. "Break riots in Berlin and in nearly every other big German city not deprived without good reason. We have deceived the enemy of many necessities of warfare and possibly some of the necessities of life. Her stocks of raw material are giving out. Economic pressure is better than any other means, will ultimately persuade

Discussing the suggestion of free trade with the British Empire Mr. Runciman remarked that the Dominions of Great Britain were not likely to alter their methods of their attitude toward the Mother Country. The colonies were determined to raise their revenue and to foster their industries in their way, and he was afraid the idea of free trade within the Empire must be dismissed. "I feel the same way of the proposed Zollverein to include all the Allies, but if such an arrangement prove essential to end the war successfully, we shall have it, for there is no arrangement that the Allies are not prepared to make to that end."

## MORE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND BOYS MAY LEAVE ENGLAND SHORTLY FOR FRONT

OTTAWA, Jan. 12.—Announcement is made by the minister of militia that the 5th brigade of the second division is being reorganized so as to form a brigade wholly of battalions from Montreal and district. It will consist of the 14th battalion, the 22nd French-Canadian battalion, the 24th battalion and the 60th battalion. The brigade will continue under the command of Brigadier General D. Watson. The 26th and 25th maritime prov-

ince battalions are being transferred from the 5th brigade to the 9th brigade of the third division. (The foregoing says a St. John exchange, would indicate that the third Canadian division, which has been at Bramshott Camp, England, under command of Lord Brooke and which includes the 56th Battalion is moving to France, up to the present there having been but two Canadian divisions on the firing line.)

### CANADIAN BATTALION IS ISOLATED BECAUSE OF MENINGITIS.

LONDON, JANUARY 13.—A Folkestone correspondent says: "A Canadian battalion has been put under strict isolation as a result of an epidemic of meningitis, which broke out a short time ago. There were ten cases in one but two deaths. All the men have been carefully examined and three carriers, that is the men who are infected with the germ, but not stricken with the disease, have been discovered. Everything possible is being done to stamp out the epidemic."

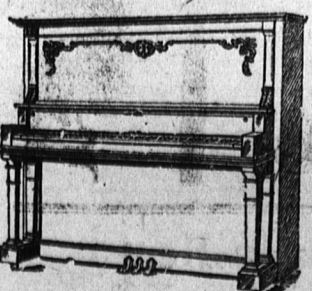
