### Truro Minister Reveals Plans

TRURO, N.S., March 9.—(CP)—Rev. Perry F. Rockwood, young Truro minister who resigned from the Presbyterian Church rather than accept the "disciplinary action" of an ecclesiastical court, today told his congregation in a farewell sermon that he planned to take up "greater work" in Truro and the Maritimes which would include the establishment of a non-denominational church. "People from all churches," he said, "have indicated their desire to support a work with a free pulpit making a definite biblical stand. Instead of burning our sermons we are going to expand this work and send messages throughout the land to answer requests from hundreds of people. We shall begin as soon as possible a modern Christian book store which will serve a large area providing the best in Evangelical literature for the homes of our people." The 28-year-old minister resigned from Truro's St. James Presbyterian Church and from the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada last week after the Halifax Evening Freeman found him guilty of "following a divisive course" in his sermons. He said he had refused to comply with a Presbytery request that he withdraw and destroy copies of sermons he had preached on the theme the church is "sick unto death." The Presbytery heard charges that he had "made a definite attempt to split the Presbyterian church" and had turned his own congregation into "two warring camps."

### Church Union Not Being Discussed

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., March 9.—(CP)—Rev. W. Gordon MacLean of Winnipeg, moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, said in an interview that "at the present moment there are no official, unrestricted conventions taking place between the Presbyterian Church in Canada and other denominations regarding church union. There may be in the future but not at present." Commenting on the resignation of Rev. Perry F. Rockwood, youthful Presbytery minister at Truro, N.S., who has left his church rather than give up "following a divisive course" in his preaching, Mr. MacLean said "he is a good lad but so far as I understand in his doctrine he is a fundamentalist and appears to have gone out of his way to attack certain of our theological professors on the score of modernism."

The moderator looked upon the incident as a tragedy in the life of the 28-year-old minister but said he would be taken back into the fold of the Presbyterian Church any time if he was willing to fall in with the law and discipline of the church. In the moderator's opinion, "this boy is a faithful minister but fanatical."

#### MR. RODERICK McLEAN PASSES

The death of Mr. Roderick MacLean, 68, is announced. The residence of his daughter, Mrs. Nell MacLeod, Orwell, March 9th. His wife died some years ago. In the death of Mr. MacLean the Belfast district loses one of its most respected and aged citizens. To visit this aged couple in their own home some few years ago was to remember them always, young people made their calls a delight. In spite of Mr. MacLean's advanced years he was always enjoyable to talk to, but for the last two years he gradually fell away to the ravages of time and old age. He was a friend to all and a good neighbor, a good living and kindly man. The funeral takes place this afternoon to Orwell Corner cemetery.

### Georgetown And Vicinity

"The first game of the semifinals in the Southern King's Hockey League playoffs, between Georgetown Eagles and Montague Ogalvies, was played on Thursday night in Montague rink. The Ogalvies emerged victorious by a 9-5 score. The game was fast and close for two periods but going into the final period leading 5-4, the Ogalvies came up with four counters, with only one reply from the Eagles. The second game of the best two out of three series, will be played in Georgetown on Monday.

Nominations have been called for March 18th to fill the vacancy in the Town Council, caused by the resignation of Councillor Waldron Lavers. The resignation of Mr. Lavers was necessitated by Government regulations, applicable to Provincial Government Public Servants, so far as participation in Municipal Politics is concerned. An election if necessary will be held on March 26th.

Capt. C. M. Fitzgerald, one of our oldest yet most active citizens, recently retired as Town Clerk. His services will be greatly missed, not only by the Council but by citizens who served faithfully and will during his term of office. The newly appointed Town Clerk, Mr. Howard Pouchere is a returned man and his appointment is a popular one. Mr. Adolphus Scully has returned to his home, following a visit to his brother, Mr. Gerald Scully in Halifax.

#### GEORGETOWN COUNCIL MONTHLY MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held on Wednesday, March 6th, in the Council Chambers.

Mayor J.A.B. McConnell and Councillors Llewellyn, Solomon, Stewart and Wight were present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and moved adopted without any corrections. The resignation of Councillor Waldron Lavers was read and accepted and the Clerk was instructed to call for nominations to fill the vacancy. The applications of two parties in the position of Town Clerk were read. Before the matter came up for further discussion one of the applications was withdrawn. On motion of Councillor Solomon, seconded by Councillor Stewart, Mr. Howard Pouchere was appointed Town Clerk. Changes in the Town's Act of Incorporation were discussed, and after agreement reached by Council, it was decided to have the changes drawn up ready for presentation to the Provincial Legislature by Mr. Frank McPhee, K. C.

The Council voted to have the Clerk write the Maritime Electric Company to have changes in street lighting system speeded up. A request is also being sent to the Canadian National Railways asking that lights be installed at all railroad crossings within the town. The Telegraph system of the Town was again under review and further action, in this matter, decided upon. The appointment of a Fire Warden brought on considerable discussion and temporary agreements only were possible, however this matter will be arranged to the satisfaction of all. Mr. Henry Martell has been offered the Fire Warden appointment up to April 15th. Expressions of regret at the resignation of Capt. C. M. Fitzgerald and of appreciation for his fine and faithful service, over the years, were voiced by the Council. Current Bills were read and ordered paid. The Clerk was instructed to order sufficient Public Recognition Certificates for those discharged veterans who have not yet received theirs. As there were no further business, the meeting was moved adjourned.
