She complained to him of feeling strange, and in a moment or two fell to the ground where she expired at once. Heart failure was the cause of death. She leaves a husband and one child, besides her father's family to mourn the sad and sudden ending of a young life just in its prime.

EXPLOSION IN A MINE UNDER TOWN

BLKGDARDEN, W. Va., April 26—Twenty-two miners were entombed in Ott mine, No. 2, of the Davis Coal and Coke company here, the result of an explosion early to-day, and little chance is held out for the rescue of any of them alive, or two full tons of debris that has thus far impeded the progress of rescuers. It cannot be learned yet whether the explosion was caused by dust or gas. Officials of the company say they have never known their mines to be gaseous. As soon as the accident became known, Superintendent Robert Grant organized a rescue corps of the miners off duty and these attempted to enter the mine. The rescue parties had not advanced far into the workings before they discovered that it would take several days to dig through the heaps of roof coal and slate that had been loosened by the explosion. It then was decided to effect an entrance nearer the probable point of the explosion by cutting through the wall of an adjoining mine owned by the same company. Late this afternoon the rescuers had penetrated to the No. 2 mine at a point about 4,000 feet from the outside entry. There still remained about the same distance to go before reaching the buried miners.

THE MINE IS UNDER THE TOWN

The Ott mine, No. 2 is almost directly under the town of Elk Garden, which is on a hill. The mouth of the mine is about half a mile from the town. CARS FOR WOMEN ON WESTERN ROADS

(CHICAGO, April 24.—The Chicago Great Western Railway has installed on its line operating between Chicago and St. Paul and Minneapolis two coaches reserved exclusively for the use of women. The new coaches are known as "woman's club cars." They are seventy feet long, built of steel and furnished with every luxury and facility that the heart of woman can desire. Besides a central drawing room each car has eight compartments, in the privacy of which the women passengers can play bridge, write their letters or take a nap. The first car made its initial trip out of Chicago Tuesday night. It is known as the "Briarcliffe."

It is not the purpose of the Great Western to make these cars movable. Adamless Edens, the road puts that matter up to the women. If they wish to invite their men friends into the cars, they are welcome to do so, but no men will be admitted without women escorts. "There's poetic justice in that," said one of the officials of the road. "We have all heard of the restaurants that won't admit women without male companions, and of hotels which won't permit single women to register. It's a poor rule that won't work both ways. Now, we have the woman's car, from which man must keep aloof until woman comes along and invites him to enter. "There is a real demand for cars of this kind—it's not just a fad. Many women feel ill at ease in even the best-appointed Pullman coaches, especially if they happen to be the only women making the trip. It was to satisfy this demand that the roads first got into the habit of maintaining men's and women's compartments in the railroad stations. Now the same idea is being carried into the trains."

PROCLAIM HOLY WAR THROUGHOUT MOROCCO

TANGIER, Morocco, April 28.—Holy war has been proclaimed throughout Morocco by native tribes against foreigners. Tribesmen are said to be flocking in great numbers to join the revolutionary forces. Evidence of widespread hostilities which is being brought in daily by couriers show that France has undertaken a tremendous task in the effort to subdue the rebellious tribesmen and maintain the power of Sultan Mulai Hafid.

Conflicting reports are received relative to the fate of Colonel Bremont, the French officer who led a relief expedition to succor Fez. Native messengers have reported both killed and safe in Fez.

Bergmann was alone at the time. Woodland was burned over before more than 100 acres of adjoining the fire was controlled and the body of Bergmann, who was seventy-five years old, was found.

LONDON, April 24.—Great curiosity has been aroused in regard to the will of Queen Mary's brother, the late Prince Francis Teck, who was such a universal favorite. No details have been published and none are expected, as it is generally believed by his friends that he left part of his small fortune to the famous Yorkshire beauty, Miss Muriel Wilson. The bare statement has been allowed to appear that Prince Francis's will has been proved and probate granted to his brothers, the Duke of Teck, who married a daughter of the late Duke of Westminster and Prince Alexander, who married the pretty daughter of the Duchess of Albany. The sum mentioned as having been left by Prince Francis is about \$116,000. He lived very modestly in bachelor rooms in Wigmore street, but during the past few years he was supposed to have made a considerable sum on the Stock Exchange, so that his friends believe that the actual sum left is far larger.

For many years Prince Francis and Miss Wilson were to be seen together at restaurants and theatres, and nearly every Autumn they would meet at Venice, where Mr. Wilson had a charming apartment, and spent their holidays together. It was stated about three years ago that the couple were secretly married, but Miss Wilson's friends always laughed at the story. The two were "chums," and were devoted to each other in a platonic way. They had practically every taste in common, and Miss Wilson has never shown any disposition to marry, in spite of the fact that she has received more proposals than any woman in England. Prince Alexander of Teck, who will receive the bulk of his brother's money, is extremely popular with the officers and men of the Household Cavalry, and his married life has been ideally happy.

HOBSON SEES WAR IN NEAR FUTURE

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 28.—Captain Richmond Pearson Hobson spoke here last night under the auspices of the local military organizations. He said that war was a certainty with Japan, and that it was equally certain that the United States would be defeated in that event. Mr. Hobson said in part: "The trouble that is sure to come will come first without doubt on the Pacific. Before nine months shall have passed in this war that this country will be engaged in, the United States will be substantially helpless and will experience continual defeat. "We have nine thousand men at San Antonio, not 20,000 as has been reported. We are short of men, officers, animals and equipment."

FALLS FIVE TIMES AS HIGH AS NIAGARA

NEW YORK, April 27.—Sir T. Crossley Haynor, attorney general of British Guiana, is in New York today on his first visit to this country. He is one of the few white men who have ever seen Kaieteur Falls, which he describes the most beautiful and impressive in the world. Sir Crossley will visit Niagara Falls for the purpose of comparison, before leaving for England to attend the coronation ceremonies. Kaieteur Falls are far inland in British Guiana. He said in his interview on shipboard. "So far inland, in fact, that they are about 200 miles from civilization. They are 825 feet in height, nearly five times as high as Niagara, and about 400 feet wide."
