DEATH OF HENRY C. DOUCE.

The death occurred yesterday of a well-known and respected citizen in the person of Henry C. Douce, for many years an active figure in civic politics as a representative at various times of Wards One, Two and Three in the City Council. During the past five years Mr. Douce had held the position of Water Commissioner to which position he was last February re-elected by acclamation. These marks of public confidence indicated the regard in which he was held by his fellow citizens.

The deceased gentleman was a son of the late Hon. William Douce, and was born in 1837. Early in life he married Miss James, who survives him. Three sons, Harry, Victor and Arthur, with four daughters, Mrs. R. Farquharson, Mrs. H. M. Davison, Miss Bertha and Miss Daisy are also left to mourn, to whom widespread sympathy will be extended. Mr. Douce had been for years in failing health. He was a warmhearted sympathetic friend, and in civic life stood for square dealing and economy.

Two life sentences and one of twenty-five years is the award meted out to the convicted train robbers in British Columbia. They well deserve their fate.

The first list of Eminent Islanders which came to hand yesterday is different in every way from that already published. This correspondent makes a pretty good list without including any of the rather noteworthy names before mentioned in this column. This shows how widely people will differ in their estimate of what constitutes eminence. There are of two ladies, two doctors, one ymen, one judge, half a dozen merchants and as many representative politicians, all living, are included in this list.

Long ago Ottawa adopted the name and style of "Their Excellencies" for the Governor General and his wife, and the latter has been designated "Her Excellency" in the Ottawa newspapers for almost a generation past. The newspapers of other cities were dubious in their attitude toward this latter title. It had no official recognition in the Mother Country. Among many contraverses on the subject the case of the farmer who was appointed a magistrate and hence to be thereafter known as an esquire was cited. As the story is told, the magistrate's wife inquired whether she would be now a Squire as well as he! The unkind answer was, "No. You'll be the same old fool you always was." But the controversy respecting Her Excellency has now been settled by royal command and the wife of the Governor General will hereafter be properly accorded the title heretofore only given by courtesy.

ANSION.

Here are some figures culled from Hon. Mr. Fielding's budget speech, which show the expansion of Canadian business along various lines in thirty years between 1875 and 1905:

In the ten years, 1895 to 1905 the total disbursements from the public treasury increased 83 per cent; the total trade 100 per cent; consolidated revenue 100 per cent; bank deposits 136 per cent; bank discounts 111 per cent; tonnage carried by railways 114 per cent.

A portable wireless telegraph outfit, sufficiently powerful to transmit messages thirty miles, small enough to be carried in a coat pocket and not weighing more than two pounds, is to be supplied to the United States navy. Thus equipped a landing party can keep in communication with the ships, or with another party at a distance on land.

Japan is taking strong ground for Government ownership of public works and utilities. The railways of Manchuria will be owned and managed by the Government. It has also been decided to take over all the company railways in Japan. The price will be \$31,500,000 yen. This figure is reached by the singular process of taking twenty times the average of the profits, divided by the cost of construction and multiplied by the paid-up capital.

A. By Law for levying and specifying the rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Role in the City of Charlottetown for a Water and Sewerage Fund under Statute 1, Edward VII Chapter 2.

Be it Enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—
1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for a Water and Sewerage Fund under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January A. D. 1906 and ending the thirty first day of December A. D. 1906 is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one quarter of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the Said City of Charlottetown in the general assessment Book and Valuation Role of all Real Estate and Personal Property, liable to taxation in Said City and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein made and duly returned by them on the 16th day of May A. D. 1906.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such Water and Sewerage Fund for the year commencing the first day of January A. D. 1906 and ending the thirty first day of December A. D. 1906 is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one quarter of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the assessors of the Said City in said general Assessment Book and Valuation Role made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

3rd. The amount of Poll tax to be paid by every person returned by the said assessors in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Role as liable thereto for such water fund under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January A. D. 1906 and ending the thirty first day of December A. D. 1906 is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of twenty five cents on every pole of every person so assessed and returned as aforesaid.

A. By Law for levying and specifying the rate of assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes under Statute 3 Edward VII Chapter 17. Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January A. D. 1906 and ending the thirty first day of December A. D. 1906 is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one and one eighth per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City and of all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein made and duly returned by them on the 16th day of May A. D. 1906.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such general civic purposes for the year commencing the first day of January A. D. 1906 and ending the thirty first day of December A. D. 1906 is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one and one eighth per cent of every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the assessors of the said city in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll made and duly returned by them as afores 11.

A. By law for allowing the rate of Discount on the assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty first day of December A. D. 1906.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—
1st. A discount at the rate of two and one half per cent shall be allowed to all Tax payers who shall, on or before the twentieth day of July A. D. 1906 pay the City Clerk at his office the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property for civic purposes.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 5 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

Entries must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon that land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for entry.

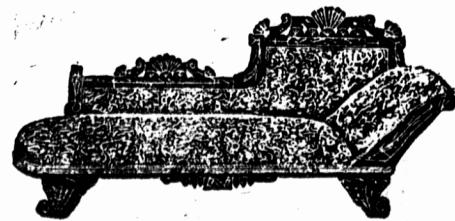
